Vice-Chair Crosley called the meeting to order at 9:10 a.m.

AGENDA - ADDITIONS/REORDER

No additions or reorders were made to the Agenda and it was noted there was a revised Agenda sent out and available on the back table and is the Agenda being utilized at this meeting. Ms. Rojo stated the revised Agenda removed item II Business Item C from the original Agenda.

II. BUSINESS ITEMS

A. CONSIDER FIRST AMENDMENT TO PEACE AGREEMENT AND WATERMASTER RESOLUTION 2004-

Counsel Fife noted this item has been distributed and out for approximately two weeks and that the committee members should be familiar with its context. The motion to clarify what we are seeking is in two parts. First, the Pool itself, since the Pool was a signatory to the Peace Agreement the Pool needs to authorize its Vice-Chair to sign the first Amendment. Second, the Watermaster is not a signatory to the Peace Agreement; however, Watermaster did adopt a resolution committing it to proceed in accordance with the Peace Agreement. The Watermaster Board will need to adopt the Resolution which is included in the packet at the Board meeting at the end of this month.

Motion by Jeske, second by Kinsey, and by unanimous vote Moved to open this item for discussion

The question regarding the method of calculation for safe yield along with an inquiry regarding the signature block was presented. Mr. Jeske broadened his question regarding the signature block by inquiring about Kaiser Venture. It was noted that Kaiser Venture is still a party to the Judgment. A discussion ensued and Counsel Fife gave comment. A question regarding the verbiage of either "storm recharge" or "storm water" was presented. Counsel Fife stated there is not a formal name, however, that it does need to be consistent. Mr. Jeske commented since it is not a defined term, according to Counsel, and since one or more agencies have already acted on this Amendment it was Mr. Jeske's recommendation to leave the verbiage as is. The question of what happens if all the signatories have not approved this First Amendment prior to the set court date was presented. Counsel Fife commented there is not a defined target date and that all parties are hoping it will go through the processes in a timely manner. Counsel Fife stated the next court date is set for October 14, 2004; however, the court has been notified that when we go to court on October, 14, we might be short a few signatures.

Motion by Jeske, second by Kinsey, and by unanimous vote

Moved for approval for the authorized Vice-Chairman to sign the first amendment to the Peace Agreement and to authorize Watermaster to adopt as a Resolution, as presented

B. DISCUSS ISSUES CONCERNING AGRICULTURAL POOL CREDIT AND TRANSFERS

Counsel Fife commented that at the last Agricultural Pool meeting in August; the handout which has been distributed, and is now available on the back table, was circulated at that Ag Pool meeting and was discussed at length. During the Ag Pool meeting staff was asked to place this item on the Agendas for the other Pools for discussion purposes; there is no action being requested at this time. This is a proposal coming out of the Agricultural Pool and they are seeking comments. Mr. Kinsey noted as he has read through this handout, it appears the procedures in process are already in place through assignment of Agricultural production rights to accomplish this very same proposal. Mr. Kinsey stated Monte Vista needs better understanding for deal point number one and read the item verbatim. Mr. Kinsey said he does not know how it effects the provisions of the Peace Agreement which talks about the early transfers and unpumped Agricultural rights. Mr. Kinsey inquired if this item is to be handled through the Attorney/Manager process which is currently in progress or is this a separate issue that needs to be addressed. Counsel Fife commented the need to see where the appropriate place to discuss this issue is, we would appreciate Pool feedback on this. Counsel Fife affirmed, it was stated at the Agricultural Pool meeting that this is new to staff as well as Counsel and staff would not be prepared to explain the proposal in detail and an Agricultural Pool representative needed to be present if it was to be presented in full. A discussion ensued and Mr. Jeske noted an assignment process is already in place and that several parties are familiar with it. Mr. Jeske reiterated the question of what is the proper format for discussing it: the first level of discussion needs to be through the Attorney/Managers process and it was noted this item was brought up at one of the meetings. Mr. Jeske noted the other option would be to form a work group which implies a separate core work group from the Attorney/Manager work group and would be held separately. We need to be careful to coordinate any resolution from the work group with any resolution coming out on those same or similar topics from the Attorney/Manager's group; then it can go through the regular Pool process. It was decided this item will be discussed at the upcoming Attorney/Manger meeting and if the outcome is to go through the Pool process, it can be added to next months Agenda. No motion is needed to add this item to the discussion work group at the next Attorney/Manager meeting. Mr. Jeske noted a designated process has been discussed and is to be reflected in the minutes as to the Agricultural Pools awareness this item has been addressed.

Counsel Fife asked Vice-Chair Crosley if we could return to Business item A due to the Non-Agricultural Pool representation needing an explicit acknowledgement as well as the Appropriative Pool members because the Non-Ag Pool is a signatory to the Peace Agreement.

The Non-Agricultural Pool representative, Justin M. Scott-Coe, acknowledged his approval of the motion which was made regarding the two part motion for Business item A (the First Amendment to the Peace Agreement).

III. REPORTS/UPDATES

A. WATERMASTER GENERAL LEGAL COUNSEL REPORT

1. September 2, 2004 Hearing

Counsel Fife stated there was a hearing last week on Monte Vista's motion and the outcome of that hearing was that we did continue the motion until October 14, 2004. We have notified the court that hearing will most likely take the form of a Status Report to the court since all parties may not have signed the First Amendment. The Watermaster Board will not be able to act on that until its meeting on the 30th; at best we will have the signatures and prepared the transmittal pleading, we may have filed it but will not be ready for an actual hearing for the court to approve it at that time. Counsel Fife noted we would have liked to have met with the court at the end of October on this issue; however, the court will be on vacation for a few weeks right after October 14, 2004. The hearing for this item should be in mid to late November.

2. Castaic Lake Water Agency Meetings

Counsel Fife stated this Pool directed counsel to contact Castaic Lake in response to their letter offering to buy a portion of water in storage; they were contacted and discussions

have started by way of meetings. Counsel Fife noted last week Watermaster staff and counsel made an appearance and gave a presentation at their Water Resources Sub-Committee meeting on the resources we have here in the Chino Basin which was very favorably received. There will be more detail and deal points addressed at the upcoming Attorney/Manager meeting.

3. Attorney/Manager Meetings

Counsel Fife stated the next Attorney/Manager meeting will be this coming Monday which will start promptly at 9:00 a.m. we had anticipated more technical information, however, that information will not be available by Monday so the more non-technical issues will be addressed.

Counsel Fife added comment in regards to item 2 and that we have also been contacted by San Diego about storage space and we have responded to those inquires. Counsel Fife noted that staff along with counsel will be meeting with representatives from San Diego to begin similar discussions resembling Castaic Lake's.

Added Item

4. Counsel Fife added an item regarding the Basin Plan Amendment and commented there was a workshop at the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) yesterday. The agenda and materials which were presented are available as a handout on the back table. The Basin Plan Amendment was very favorably received by the State Board. Counsel Fife understood that the Basin Plan Amendment has been put on SWRCB's consent calendar for their meeting at the end of this month, after that, it must be approved by the California Office of Administrative Law. Counsel Fife stated once that has happened it will be fully approved and operative.

B. STAFF REPORT

1. Update on Cleanup and Abatement Orders

Ms. Rojo noted Watermaster had received a request for follow up on the cleanup and abatement orders which Mark Wildermuth was tasked to check into. Mr. Wildermuth stated Watermaster approved for Wildermuth Environmental to help the Regional Board develop draft cleanup and abatement orders against Potential Responsible Parties (PRPs) in the area of the Ontario International Airport. Five draft orders were prepared and have circulated back and forth between our firm and the Regional Board; three of those five have reached a final stage and the remaining two are still under consideration by the Board staff. Mr. Wildermuth is anticipating all five to be finalized and issued sometime in the October time frame. The time delay has been primarily due to the review time. Mr. Wildermuth named the five parties which will be receiving the cleanup and abatement orders.

Agricultural Pool is Requesting Feedback/Comments on "How to Support the Recycled Water Plan"

Ms. Rojo commented that during the Ag Pool meeting in August Mr. Atwater discussed recycled water efforts that IEUA has been undertaking and that Mr. Koopman requested if any of the appropriators could provide feedback on what the agricultural users could do to support the recycled water plan. That feedback would be taken in by Watermaster and brought back to the next Agricultural Pool meeting in October. The question was presented to staff if this item was in conjunction with the Ag Pool Proposal. Ms. Rojo noted that when these subjects were raised at the Ag Pool meeting they were two very different points of interest and it seemed that the first item was more from a thought process of credits or transfer fees, yet this item under this staff report which is requesting feedback, is more a matter of the Ag Pool users expressing an interest in further participating in the recycled water efforts for those who are not partaking or further enhance the recycled water usage for those who are already participating. Mr. Jeske

noted for the committee's information, and for the record, Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) has a consultant, Montgomery Watson, doing a complete Recycled Water System Master Plan and is also doing any necessary environmental work for a phased approached to a large regional system amongst the agencies that participate through the IEUA Regional Sewer Program. As a subset out of the various agencies, along with IEUA water quality people have already been in the field making contacts with numerous prospective users; part of the study was to identify prospective users of recycled water, their locations, and assisting master planning out where the regional distribution lines would be. There is a lot of work in progress and many agencies have been in the field with IEUA's water quality people directly discussing marketing both to industrial and irrigation users which would include Agricultural users. This is not a program that will require a lot of additional incentive; it is a program that is already occurring. Ms. Rojo commented that Watermaster staff has been participating in the Recycled Water Steering Committee meetings at IEUA which leaves us very aware of this program and it was felt that the Ag Pool just wanted to further express their interest in this program.

3. <u>Update on Subsidence Monitoring Program</u>

Ms. Rojo wished Andy Malone a very happy birthday and thanked him for being able to come out and give an update on the Subsidence Monitoring Program. Ms. Rojo commented there are some real interesting things happening with pump tests that are taking place and some extensometer results. Mr. Malone noted that some of the parties present are in management zone 1 and most understand what we are doing out there in our investigations in management zone 1. Mr. Malone stated that they have been measuring subsidence and observed ground fissuring that occurred in the early 1990's and what we are doing is an investigation to figure out the mechanisms behind that subsidence and fissuring; while trying to figure out a long term operating plan concurrently. Mr. Malone reviewed the PA7 vs Deep Extensometer data graph and discussed this graph in detail. Mr. Wildermuth added comment regarding the small amount of inelastic compaction which appeared to occur between last summer and now; it is separate and distinct from the inelastic compaction that we are trying to cause by design and Mr. Wildermuth asked Mr. Malone to explain the difference in more detail. Mr. Malone referred to the stress strain diagram and gave a detailed explanation. Mr. Malone stated there was a workshop with the special referee that has been postponed once or twice and as the MZ1 Committee reviews data, and as a committee, we are recommending we reschedule that workshop to sometime in January 2005. Choosing this later date will allow for the completion of the pumping test, analysis of that data, time to plan for the next year, and one more MZ1 meeting prior to that workshop. Mr. Malone noted that he has been making some presentations on the work that has been taking place, one was to the Inland Geological Society a few weeks ago, and the next will take place at the upcoming Groundwater Resources Association at the end of September, and the last one for this year is scheduled for the American Water Resources Association (AWRA) Annual Conference at the beginning of November. Mr. Kinsey stated that at the MZ1 Technical meetings there had been discussions about a demonstration injection program and commented on Monte Vista providing the water for that demonstration and inquired if there was a schedule to implement that program. It was stated that we do have budget in this fiscal year to implement that pumping test which does not include the cost of the water; it is up to the city to implement the program and to date there is no schedule. Mr. Kinsey stated that Monte Vista has offered to deliver the water at no cost to Watermaster. Mr. Majone commented this topic will be added to the next MZ1 Technical Committee's agenda for discussion.

Added Comment:

Ms. Rojo added comment regarding the OC-59 and noted that it has been on for the last nine days and that we are getting a lot of water. Montclair has been undergoing repairs on their Basins 3 and 4 so we are taking water in at Basin 1 and 2 for Montclair, and so that we could be taking the maximum out of OC-59, water has also been going into the Brooks Basin.

Ms. Rojo noted this is all going really well and we are getting about 100 acre-feet a day. The question of whether or not this was meeting our replenishment overdraft or is this part of the 6,500 acre-feet for this year was presented. Ms. Rojo stated that was a good question, which opens the arena for when the committee members want to see it on the agenda. We do need to look at our net replenishment from the prior year as well as the 6,500 acre-feet obligation for this year and figure out how we want to get that obligation met. We are trying to get as much wet water as we can especially towards the 6,500 acre-feet, however, MET's rates will be increasing January 1, 2005 so if we want to take the unmet obligation from our cyclic account before the end of the year we will have to discuss that. Staff has been speaking with Mr. Atwater who has been discussing with MET the possibility of MET reducing their replenishment rate by ten dollars instead of increasing it five. The question of whether or not we should be looking into this issue prior to the assessment package for this fall was presented. Ms. Rojo stated this issue will possibly be brought forth on the October agenda; to let you start thinking about that now. We are going to continue to take as much wet water as we can, especially into MZ1. The question regarding the work being done at Montclair 3 and 4 Basins and if that work will be completed shortly to allow water to be put in there this year was presented. We are putting water into Basins 1 and 2, and then, because it is being taken in at 50 c.f.s. which is more than Montclair can take in we have been putting the remainder into Brooks Basin which is giving us a good opportunity to look at Brook's perk rate. Vice-Chair Crosley asked staff if Watermaster was planning on agendizing this replenishment subject matter in October and possibly the availability of a draft assessments package in November. Ms. Rojo noted taking the water out of the cyclic account would be a water accounting issue; water has already been billed for and will not have any effect on the assessment package. Ms. Rojo commented what we would be looking for would be at what point do we want to buy it out of cyclic. Vice-Chair Crosley asked staff if with that answer we would be looking at getting the draft assessment packages in October and Ms. Rojo stated no. Ms. Rojo commented that Watermaster is still trying to tie out production for June 30 and we are still waiting on some people's production. Ms. Rojo reiterated it is a matter of finishing production and then starting to prepare the assessment package. If we get a rough draft done in the next month it will more than likely that we would see something in the November package. Ms. Rojo stated that Mr. Manning and she were discussing a possible work group or work shop when the time comes.

4. "Think Environment Week" Flyer"

Ms. Rojo noted that Mr. Kuhn brought forth this opportunity at the last Watermaster Board meeting to increase water awareness through the Daily Bulletin; a special insert is done for the newspaper and a lot of the individual agencies were participating. Mr. Kuhn felt it would be a good idea for Watermaster to try and put something together, however, the deadline was too short for this particular issue date. A brief discussion ensued and it was noted Watermaster will look into this next year in enough time to pursue this item.

V. POOL MEMBER COMMENTS

Vice-Chair Crosley welcomed Mr. Manning to the Chino Basin Watermaster and to his first Appropriative and Non-Agricultural Pool meeting. Mr. Manning stated he appreciated the welcome and that so far working with the Watermaster staff had been a pleasure and he looks forward to getting to know each committee member better but wanted to say a special thanks to Sheri Rojo who has been carrying the meeting and to counsel for all their assistance thus far.

Chair deBoom called the Agricultural Pool meeting to order at 9:10 a.m.

AGENDA - ADDITIONS/REORDER

Chair deBoom gave a brief introduction for Mr. Ken Manning, Watermaster's new Chief Executive Officer. Chair deBoom noted he had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Manning through the hiring process and welcomed him to the Agricultural Pool meeting. Mr. Feenstra gave Mr. Manning a special welcome and thanked him for recently attending the Ken Calvert reception to meet various key people. Mr. Feenstra gave Ms. Rojo a special thank you for stepping up in the interim as in as Chief of Watermaster and noted she had done an excellent job. Mr. Manning expressed his appreciation for the welcome and stated his desire to get to know each of the committee members. Each committee member introduced themselves and noted who they were representing.

II. BUSINESS ITEMS

A. CONSIDER FIRST AMENDMENT TO PEACE AGREEMENT AND WATERMASTER RESOLUTION 2004-

Counsel Fife noted that Watermaster was seeking two motions today concerning the First Amendment to the Peach Agreement. This is an amendment to the Peace Agreement and the Peace Agreement had a number of signatories to it, one of which was the Agricultural Pool. Watermaster itself did not sign the Peace Agreement instead it adopted a Resolution that committed Watermaster to proceed in accordance with the Peace Agreement. In amending the Peace Agreement two actions are needed from each of the pools; the first is for the Pool itself to consent to the Amendment, that will authorize the Chair to actually sign the Amendment, the second will be recommend to Watermaster that it adopt a Resolution committing Watermaster to proceed with the Peace Agreement as amended. Counsel Fife explained what the amendment is; this is an outcome of the salt credit issue. This has come up because of the Basin Plan Amendment which is in the process of being adopted by the State Board presently. Previous to the Basin Plan Amendment the whole process for salt removal in the Basin through the Regional Board was that we would perform some activities primarily constructed Desalters which would remove salt from the southern end of the basin. In exchange we would be permitted to do salt loading activities, primarily recycled water recharge which adds salt to the basin. The way the Regional Board was going to work out this transaction was through salt credits, when the Desalters would take out an increment of salt, we would get a credit and we could use that to put recycled water into the basin. With the new Basin Plan Amendment we do not need that process. Then the whole concept of salt credits goes off the table; however, there is a whole section in the Peace Agreement concerning salt credits and certain parties felt they bargained away certain items of value to themselves in exchange for the value they anticipated to get out of salt credits. Primarily they felt that they gave up their portion of the storm water yield which we are getting through our recharge improvement project. Counsel Fife stated this problem was solved with the First Amendment which is a very simple amendment; it eliminates the whole section of salt credits from the Peace Agreement and then in return it gives all the parties back their portion of the storm water yield from the recharge improvement projects. Counsel Fife noted that instead of devoting that yield to Desalter replenishment we are simply allocating it back to the parties. The question regarding losses from the 25,000 acre-foot of Kaiser water was presented. Counsel Fife commented we are not charging losses against water in storage right now, but will begin in 2005. Mr. Koopman inquired about Recitals D and its referring to safe yield. Counsel Fife gave a detail explanation regarding safe yield as set in the Judgment. Counsel Fife commented that we are not changing

the safe yield right now so it is being called new yield. The Peace Agreement then separately commits that we will not revisit the safe yield in the Basin any earlier than the 2010/2011 fiscal year; after that we could go through a process and that would involve all of Watermaster including the Ag Pool for re-determining the safe yield. Counsel Fife affirmed what Recitals D says even if after 2010/2011 if we add in that component into the safe yield we are not then going to turn around and independently use that component of safe yield for the Desalters. Counsel Fife referred to Recitals E for further comment to Mr. Koopman's inquiry. A lengthy discussion ensued regarding salt credits, safe yield, and the First Amendment. Mr. Koopman inquired from Ag Pool Counsel if it was his thought that this First Amendment was appropriate. Counsel Lee stated it was a good First Amendment and Resolution. A discussion ensued regarding new yield. Ms. Rojo stated this new yield only applies to the appropriators and that the additional acre-feet from the storm water recapture from the Recharge Improvement Project is going just to the appropriators who were paying for the project versus the Desalter Replenishment which will be hit by everybody including the non-agricultural users. question regarding an approval of the amendment time frame was presented. Counsel Fife stated it needs to go to the Advisory Committee and the Watermaster Board on September 30. the individual entities that are signatories to the Peace Agreement are all taking this to their Boards, once we have all signatures together we will submit those to the court, schedule a hearing sometime in November for final approval. Mr. Koopman presented staff with the question with regards to non-agricultural and new water. Counsel Fife gave a brief description on new yield and an explanation on safe yield in regards to Mr. Koopman's inquiry.

Ms. Rojo addressed Chair deBoom with a suggestion to move up the presentation being given by Andy Malone under item B, no. 5 regarding an update on the Subsidence Monitoring Program and then a brief update on item B, no. 2 the clean up and abatement orders noting that Mr. Malone needs to leave shortly for another appointment. Chair deBoom recognized this request and asked that Mr. Malone's presentation and update be moved up for the next item.

2. Update on the Cleanup and Abatement Orders

Mr. Malone stated Watermaster approved for Wildermuth Environmental to help the Regional Board develop draft cleanup and abatement orders against Potential Responsible Parties in the area of the Ontario International Airport. Five draft orders were prepared and have circulated back and forth between the Regional Board; three of those five have reached a final stage and the remaining two are still under consideration by the Board staff. Mr. Malone is anticipating all five to be finalized and issued sometime in the October time frame.

5. <u>Update on Subsidence Monitoring Program</u>

Ms. Rojo commented there are some real interesting things happening with pump tests that are going to be taking place shortly and some extensometer results. Mr. Malone stated that they have been measuring subsidence and observing ground fissuring that occurred in the early 1990's and what we are doing is an investigation to figure out the

mechanisms behind that subsidence and fissuring; while trying to figure out a long term operating plan concurrently. Mr. Malone stated there will be a workshop with the special referee that we are scheduling sometime in January 2005. Choosing this later date will allow for the completion of the post pumping test, analysis of that data, time to plan for the next year, and one more MZ1 meeting prior to that workshop. Mr. Malone noted that Mr. Wildermuth has been making some presentations on the work that has been taking place, one was to the Inland Geological Society a few weeks ago, and the next will take place at the upcoming Groundwater Resources Association at the end of September, and the last one for this year is scheduled for the American Water Resources Association (AWRA) Annual Conference at the beginning of November. Chair deBoom inquired about the Technical Committee; do transfers in and out of the MZ1 ever go in front of the Technical Committee. Mr. Malone commented yes that does happen, and stated the Technical Committee in general is concerned with maintaining water levels in the MZ1 area so transfers that would allow more pumping without recharge into the MZ1 is something the Technical Committee would look at skeptically. Mr. Feenstra added comment regarding losing about 60 pumpers in this basin mainly in agricultural areas and inquired if there would be a change in the water levels due to this. Mr. Malone stated we would not see that occur. Mr. Malone gave a brief description on the subsurface barrier which would support his statement. The question regarding subsidence in the 90's was presented. Mr. Malone gave a detailed explanation of what occurred in the late 80's/early 90's regarding deep wells being drilled and the compaction that took place at that time that will not take place again.

B. DISCUSS ISSUES CONCERNING AGRICULTURAL POOL CREDIT AND TRANSFERS

Counsel Lee commented on what had taken place at the last Attorney/Manager meeting with regard to this request and at that meeting it appeared there was a decision that there was no reason to have Pool, Advisory Committee, or Watermaster Board approval for this credit and transfer fee. It was noted at that meeting that the Agricultural Pool needed to contact the appropriators directly. Counsel Lee felt the Agricultural Pool can arrange a meeting with each city that has an interest and jointly work out the details. Mr. Koopman presented the question of whether Ag Pool transfers would then come through the Ag Pool like the other transfers we see on the consent calendar. Counsel Lee confirmed that a work group with IEUA, Ken Jeske. and Dave Crosley would be beneficial to decide on processes. Mr. Koopman brought up the Cal Trans water transfer, which was to have gone through Watermaster and due to no historical production, was turned down, for discussion. Counsel Fife returned comment and noted Mr. Koopman's statements needed some looking into. A discussion ensued regarding historical production. It was noted that if a party is an Ag member we can not say some can do this transfer and some can not. Counsel Fife commented that separate issues were being brought forth and might need to be addressed at a separate time. The question regarding Cal Trans was presented again and Counsel Fife noted he has not seen this transfer. Ms. Rojo stated she spoke with Traci and did not get a clear answer, nevertheless will look into this question further. A lengthy discussion ensued regarding credits and pumping.

III. REPORTS/UPDATES

A. WATERMASTER GENERAL LEGAL COUNSEL REPORT

1. September 2, 2004 Hearing

Counsel Fife stated there was a hearing recently on Monte Vista's motion and the outcome of that hearing was that we did continue the motion until October 14, 2004. We have notified the court that hearing will most likely take the form of a Status Report to the court since all parties may not have signed the First Amendment. The Watermaster Board will not be able to act on that until its meeting on the 30th; at best we will have the signatures and prepared the transmittal pleading, we may have filed it but will not be ready for an actual hearing for the court to approve it at that time. Counsel Fife noted we would have liked to have met with the court at the end of October on this issue; however, the

court will be on vacation for a few weeks right after October 14, 2004. The hearing for this item should be in mid to late November.

Castaic Lake Water Agency Meetings

Counsel Fife stated this Pool directed counsel to contact Castaic Lake in response to their letter offering to buy a portion of water in storage; they were contacted and discussions have started by way of meetings. Counsel Fife noted that the Non-Agricultural Pool has expressed interest in transferring their stored water to somebody and Castaic looks like a likely buyer for that water; meaning they would buy water already in storage. We are looking at getting some kind of initial deal by the end of the year.

3. Attorney/Manager Meetings

Counsel Fife stated the Attorney/Manager process is still continuing. A meeting was held on September 13, and we are waiting for some technical work concerning the hydraulic control concept; once we get that technical data we will be having another series of meetings.

B. STAFF REPORT

- Update on Pilot Project at IEUA for Composting and Other Related Studies

 Ms. Rojo poted Rich Atwater was to give company on this item and Ohio
 - Ms. Rojo noted Rich Atwater was to give comment on this item and Chair deBoom stated that Mr. Feenstra would be able to offer an update regarding this item. Mr. Feenstra commented that he has entered into a series of meetings for projects to do composting waste within this basin in conjunction with Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA), Los Angeles County, Orange County, Eastern, Western, and others that will come to the table as well as the regulators at the Regional Water Quality Control Board, South Coast Air Quality Management District an so on. The purpose of this pilot project is to protect air, to test the scientific responses to using different technologies to put these different wastes into a composting process using technologies like the "Ag Bag" that is being used extensively in Dixon California by the city of San Francisco. The other methods would be containers that you see going on ships where there would be in container type composting going on and other technologies that we are going to utilize in this whole two to three year process. The pilot project will utilize these wastes for farming, to save water, and to conserve water. This is very exciting, however, we need to get as many players to the table as possible and IEUA was thanked for being the first to do so. Mr. Feenstra noted parties are asking for scientific studies that will be done at various college facilities over the three year period. Mr. Feenstra noted water districts and agencies will also be asked to take part financially. Mr. Feenstra offered more details on this new pilot project. During a presentation yesterday we started by asking each party present, "how many bags do you want to buy" in trying to get money coming in for this project right away. Mr. Feenstra made a personal plea to the Committee members to participate financially to this endeavor and Chair deBoom asked Mr. Feenstra how much money was he looking at receiving from the Agricultural Pool and Mr. Feenstra answered they are requesting \$10,000 at this time. Mr. Koopman inquired as to who had contributed thus far and who the other parties were that would be involved in this endeavor. A lengthy discussion ensued with this regard. It was requested of Mr. Feenstra to put together a plan/proposal and to get together with Mr. Manning and others who are interested in this new program and discuss its possibilities and financial needs.
- Update on the Cleanup and Abatement Orders
 This item was taken out of order by Chair deBoom.
- 3. Recycled Water Usage Update
 No comment was made regarding this item.

4. Agricultural Pool is Requesting Feedback/Comments on "How to Support the Recycled Water Plan"

Mr. Manning noted that Mr. Kuhn brought forth this opportunity at the last Watermaster Board meeting to increase water awareness through the Daily Bulletin; a special insert is done for the newspaper and a lot of the individual agencies were participating. Mr. Kuhn felt it would be a good idea for Watermaster to try and put something together, however, the deadline was too short for this particular issue date. A brief discussion ensued and it was noted Watermaster will look into this next year in enough time to pursue this item.

The Court approved the Peace Agreement, the Implementation Plan and the goals and objectives identified in the OBMP Phase I Report on July 13, 2000, and ordered Watermaster to proceed in a manner consistent with the Peace Agreement. Under the Peace Agreement, Watermaster approval is required for applications to store, recapture, recharge or transfer water, as well as for applications for credits or reimbursements and storage and recovery programs.

Where there is no material physical injury, Watermaster must approve the transaction. Where the request for Watermaster approval is submitted by a party to the Judgment, there is a rebuttable presumption that most of the transactions do not result in Material Physical Injury to a party to the Judgment or the Basin (Storage and Recovery Programs do not have this presumption).

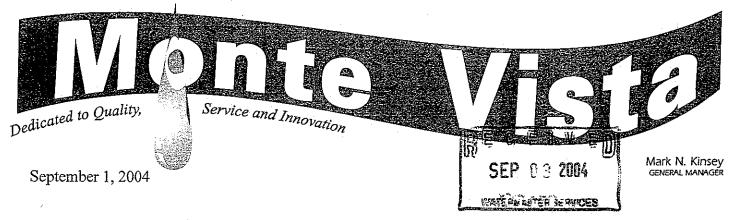

DISCUSSION

Water transactions occur each year and are included as production by the respective entity (if produced) in any relevant analyses conducted by Wildermuth Environmental pursuant to the Peace Agreement and the Rules & Regulations. There is no indication additional analysis regarding this transaction is necessary at this time. As part of the OBMP Implementation Plan, continued measurement of water levels and the installation of extensometers are planned. Based on no real change in the available data, we cannot conclude that the proposed water transaction will cause material physical injury to a party or to the Basin.

Because Monte Vista Water District did not submit a Form 4, Application or Amendment to Application to Recapture Water in Storage, it is assumed that it does not have any current plans to recapture the water. If Monte Vista Water District later decides it wishes to recapture the water from storage, it will need to submit a Form 4. If and when the Form 4 is submitted, Watermaster will evaluate for potential Material Physical injury.

Issue - Authorization of Phase 2 Investigation by URS Corp of College Heights Basins Infiltration Capacity

Recommendation - Approve the additional geotechnical services proposed by URS in their Revised Cost Proposal dated September 28, 2004. The proposal includes the drilling of three additional borings downgradient of the College Heights Basins; installing monitoring wells of 100 and 140 ft (nested) in the two deeper borings, and a single monitoring well in the shallow 50 ft boring; and installing pressure transducers and data loggers, provided by Watermaster, in 11 new and existing monitoring wells.

Fiscal Impact - The cost estimate for URS services is \$70,403; and an additional cost of \$14,000 for the Watermaster provided pressure transducers and data loggers.

BACKGROUND

The Phase 1 studied conducted by URS consisted of the installation of four new monitoring wells to supplement the two existing wells located immediately downgradient of the College Heights East Basin. The new monitoring wells were located immediately downgradient of the College Heights West Basin and the Upland Basin, and were located to monitor the rise in groundwater level in the wells when water was allowed to infiltrate from the College Heights basins. The duration of the infiltration testing was limited to 2 days, with a total of 100 acre-feet recharged in the College Heights West Basin, because of a lack of available imported water from MWDSC. In spite of the limited test program, URS reported the following:

As observed previously, water infiltrating in the College Heights basins moves relatively quickly in a southern direction under Arrow Route toward Upland Basin.

These results were reported to the Groundwater Recharge Coordinating Committee on July 12, 2004; and in a follow-up meeting at the Chino Basin Watermaster's office on July 14, 2004. The project team, consisting of IEUA, CBWM, CBWCD, City of Upland, and URS, concluded that additional subsurface geotechnical and hydro geological information in the area encompassing College Heights and Upland basins and other properties at the intersection of Arrow Route and Monte Vista Avenue was required. The project team in an August 12, 2004 meeting with URS at Watermaster also considered developing a 3-dimensional groundwater flow model, and performing additional infiltration tests with well monitoring to calibrate the model. The calibrated model would then be used to develop alternative operating scenarios for the College Heights and Upland basins.

URS subsequently developed a detailed statement of work and cost proposal for the Phase 2 Geotechnical Services, and submitted the proposal to the project team in their letter proposal of September 7, 2004. The project team evaluated the new proposal and in a telephone conference on September 23, 2004 decided to scale back the effort to the installation of the new monitoring wells and transducers. The project team concluded that with the new monitoring well system, and the use of the Upland Basin by the City of Upland to recharge stormwater, the team could acquire valuable data on the recharge capabilities of the basins, without incurring the potential liabilities associated with recharging imported water into the College Heights Basins. Furthermore the proven recharge capacities of the downstream Montclair and Brooks Basins should enable IEUA/Watermaster to meet their recharge commitments. A groundwater flow model may be developed at a later date using the data gathered during the stormwater recharge of the Upland Basin.

Staff recommends that the URS Revised Cost Proposal for Additional Geotechnical Services dated September 28, 2004, be approved, less \$29,500 for Minitrolls (transducers) which will be provided by Watermaster.

In our proposal dated September 7, 2004, URS Corporation scoped a relatively extensive study for additional evaluation of infiltration from the Inland Empire Utilities Agency's (IEUA) College Heights Basins. That proposal included the following elements:

- Obtain additional subsurface geotechnical and hydrogeological information in the area encompassing College Heights and Upland basins and other properties at the intersection of Arrow Route and Monte Vista Avenue by drilling several boreholes and installing nested monitoring wells;
- Develop a 3-dimensional groundwater flow model (saturated and unsaturated conditions) for the area of interest to this study;
- Perform additional infiltration tests with well monitoring to calibrate the model; and
- Use the calibrated model to develop alternative infiltration operations scenarios for College Heights and Upland basins.
- Evaluate structural measures that may be required to avoid jeopardizing the stability of the slopes in Upland Basin (including the Arrow Route embankment) or increasing the geologic hazards (e.g., earthquake-induced liquefaction) to any of the nearby existing and planned developments during infiltration operations.

On the basis of our telephone conference on September 23, 2004, we understand that the operational capacity of the College Heights Basins is not required for the IEUA's overall recharge program until year 2009 (more or less). Hence, it is understood that the IEUA is interested in proceeding only with the installation of additional monitoring wells at this time. It is further understood that the IEUA may or may not authorize the other proposed tasks at a later time.

This proposal presents URS' scope and proposed fees to drill and log three boreholes, and install five monitoring wells, in the area downgradient from College Heights Basins.

PROPOSED SCOPE: Monitoring Well Installation and Subsurface Characterization

There are six existing monitoring wells installed to monitor downgradient groundwater movement (i.e., toward the south) from the College Heights basins. Four of the borings for the well installations were sampled, logged, and tested for geotechnical and hydrogeologic properties, but two were not.

URS proposes to drill three more borings downgradient from the College Heights basins, and install monitoring wells in each boring, as follows:

- Two borings to 200 ft. deep and 1 boring to 50 ft. deep, using sonic drilling techniques
- Borings located: (1) adjacent to the west side of Upland Basin; and (2, 3) near the Monte Vista Ave. grade separation south of Upland Basin
- Monitoring wells installed at 140 and 100 feet (nested) in the two deeper borings, and a third monitoring well at 50 ft at the grade separation
- Minitroll pressure transducers and dataloggers installed in all new and existing monitoring wells for water level data acquisition (total of 11)

Samples of soils recovered from the boring program will be tested for grain size distribution (all soils) and plasticity (clayey soils). We will develop geologic/hydrogeologic cross sections based on the previous boring logs and the logs of the proposed borings, which will be available to provide a basis for potential future numeric groundwater model and the geotechnical evaluations.

The Minitroll installations will be "permanent," and are adaptable for future integration into a SCADA system for remote data retrieval. However, URS' scope includes set-up for on-site data retrieval (not remote).

Report

At the conclusion of our proposed work effort, URS will develop a relatively comprehensive report integrating the findings of our previous subsurface investigation efforts and these proposed studies. Specifically, our report will present the boring logs and a summary of the laboratory test results as well as geologic/hydrogeologic cross-sections representing our interpretation of the subsurface data.

It is envisioned that URS will submit up to two draft versions of the report for IEUA's and the Chino Basin Watermaster's (CBWM) review and comment, and one final report.

SUMMARY

ISSUE – The interest rate of 1.4% on the Ag Pool capital is not competitive.

Environmentally-Friendly Composting Technology Pilot Demonstration Project

SUMMARY

Issue – Milk Producers Council, in conjunction with Inland Empire Utilities Agency and South Coast Air Quality Management District is demonstrating that alternative, cost efficient composting technologies that will achieve the needed regulatory requirements.

Recommendation – Milk Producers Council, on behalf of the project, requests \$10,000 from the Agricultural Pool for the pilot demonstration project.

BACKGROUND

More than 250,000 dairy cows located in the Chino Basin produce up to one million tons of manure each year. Pathogens, salts and nutrients from this manure are leaching into the groundwater. In addition, rapid urbanization has significantly increased the storm water runoff that impacts the dairies, reducing their ability to prevent the transport of the waste material into the Santa Ana River. Dust, odor, ammonia, and volatile organic emissions from the dairy manure also contribute to air pollution. These impacts are well documented by the Regional Water Quality Control Board and Air Quality Management District studies. In fact, regulatory restrictions from the Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board and South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) will soon eliminate manure recycling on croplands throughout much of Southern California. Therefore, alternative economically feasible and regulatory compliant manure processing methods need to be evaluated. With proper testing and effective partnering with various interested agencies and stakeholders, this project will determine if presently available composting technologies will be economically feasible and meet the regulatory criteria within the Chino dairy area. Currently, different forms of composting appear suited to meet the regulatory requirements set forth by SCAQMD but have not been proven under rigorous conditions with dairy cow manure as a primary compost ingredient. These composting procedures include different types of

processing, such as: open negatively aerated static pile with exhaust vented to a biofilter, and enclosed aerated static pile. There are a handful of companies that promote both these types of composting systems, however, in this pilot research project, the technologies of three reputable vendors will be evaluated. These vendors are Ag Bag International Ltd., Gore Cover, and Nature Tech Composting Systems. In addition, one commonly used, public domain technology will be evaluated.

Benefits: Charged with regulating emissions within the Southern California area, the SCAQMD is the on the forefront of air quality regulations across the nation. In August, 2004, the SCAQMD implemented Rule 1127 in conjunction with Rule 1133, which requires ammonia and VOC emissions reductions from compost operations. Firms or operators that fail to meet these requirements will face legal consequences (e.g., large fines, cease and desist orders). Therefore, if the objectives are achieved within the proposed project, waste generators (dairy, municipalities, cities etc.) within Southern California and throughout the state will have approved alternative ways to process their waste without major impacts to air quality.

SUMMARY

Issue - There is an unmet replenishment obligation for the 2002/2003 fiscal year.

Production from the 2002/2003 fiscal year resulted in a replenishment obligation in the amount of 17,029af. During the 2003/2004 fiscal year, replenishment deliveries were 4,024af, leaving a carryover replenishment obligation in the amount of 13,005af. Through September, 2004, replenishment deliveries were 1,734af leaving an unmet replenishment obligation of 11,271af to be purchased from the cyclic account prior to December 31, 2004, when Metropolitan Water Districts Replenishment Water Rates are expected to increase \$5 per acre foot. This balance in the cyclic account after the purchase will be just above 20,000af.

Inland Empire Landmark Water Supply Program Named "Outstanding Project of the Year" By the American Society of Civil Engineers, Los Angeles Section

Inland Empire – On Saturday, October 2nd, the landmark Chino Basin Groundwater Recharge Project will receive the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE)'s top honor of "2004 Outstanding Government Civil Engineering Project of the Year" from its Los Angeles Section. This prestigious honor will be shared by the Inland Empire Utilities Agency, Chino Basin Watermaster, San Bernardino County Flood Control District, and the Chino Basin Water Conservation District.

"The Chino Basin Groundwater Recharge Project is truly a major event in the history of the Chino Basin," said IEUA Board Director Wyatt Troxel. "This landmark water supply program will enhance the region's ability to recharge our groundwater basin with over 100,000 acre-feet of new water supplies annually. This enough water to supply the needs of over 60,000 families," Troxel said.

"We are honored to be recognized for our partnership's success in developing innovative, cost effective projects that will significantly increase our region's ability to meet future drought needs for the growing population of the Basin," continued Terry Catlin, IEUA's Board Vice-President who also serves as a Chino Basin Watermaster board member. "We share this honor with the Chino Basin Watermaster, the San Bernardino County Flood Control District, and the Water Conservation District that are our partners in developing this important project," Catlin said.

The purpose of the \$40 million Chino Basin Groundwater Recharge Project is to expand and improve existing facilities within the Chino Basin in order to enhance their ability to recharge water into the groundwater basin. Sixteen recharge basins will be refurbished and three new facilities will be constructed under the program.

"This is a complex and challenging project," stated IEUA's General Manager Richard Atwater. "The overwhelming cooperation and partnership of all the agencies involved to implement a total of 19 groundwater recharge projects in less than five years is something that we are all very proud of."

The Chino Basin Groundwater Project was designed by Tettemer and Associates, a Division of the Keith Companies. Black and Veatch Consulting Engineers are assisting with the construction management for the recharge basins. The integrated project is on schedule to be fully operational by March 30, 2005.

Funding for the project is being provided through a state-local partnership. IEUA received a \$19 million grant in California's Proposition 13 Water Bonds through the Santa Ana Watershed Project Authority (SAWPA). The remaining costs of the project are being financed through local revenue bonds.

The Chino Basin is the largest groundwater basin within Southern California, holding more than 5 million acre-feet of water. For the 700,000 people served within IEUA's service area, water from the groundwater basin supplies about 70% of the water needs.

The Inland Empire Utilities Agency serves the cities of Chino, Chino Hills, Fontana, Montclair, Ontario, Upland and the Cucamonga Valley Water District and Monte Vista Water District.

County-provided water on tap for Rialto

LOMA LINDA — The regional water board ordered San Bernardino County on Friday to provide water to Rialto if a pollution plume emanating from landfill expansion property reaches an important city-owned well.

The Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board also agreed to discuss complaints from other water providers. who also say the county should give them water, at its next meeting Nov. 5.

The county plans to pump water and remove perchlorate contamination by April. It will provide the cleansed water to Rialto

Perchlorate is an ingredient in rocket fuel, fireworks and flares. It impairs thyroid functioning at certain levels. Some fear the chemical compromises brain development in young children and fetuses. water are not harmful.

If the compound reaches a city well just north of Base Line Road before April. the county will buy perchlorate-free water from other providers for the city.

The well threatened by the perchlorate plume accounts for about 15 percent of the city's water needs.

The county will likely have to provide water for decades as long as perchlorate remains. Interim Public Works Director Pat Mead said drilling the wells and installing the treatment system will cost about \$4 million.

Fontana Water Co, and West Valley Water Co., which also pump from the Rialto-Colton basin, want the board to order the county to give them water as well.

"They are more than just a polluter. they are a public agency," said Steven Elie, an attorney for the two water companies.

The county has taken responsibility for a pollution plume inching south from under the property it bought in 1995 to expand the landfill, but its consultants contend widespread perchlorate pollution in the basin comes from other sources, including a 160-acre site north Others contend minute concentrations in sof the landfill where rockets were made.

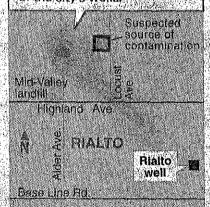

Wells expected to intercept and treat contaminated water

RIALTO -The county is moving forward with a plan to stop a pollution plume before it reaches one of the city's wells, even though the public comment period on several alternatives is weeks from ending.

"If we don't start today, this option will not be online in a timely fashion," interim Public Works Director Pat Mead said during a presentation to the Bernardino County Board of Su-

pervisors this week.

The Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board has ordered the county to provide Rialto with replacement water by April 1 or sooner if a perchlorate pollution plume moving south from county property hits a city well just north of Base Line Road before then.

The county plans to dig six wells in the plume's path, pump and treat the water, and then return it to the city's water supply system.

Supervisors agreed Tuesday to pay consultant GeoLogic Associates \$447,268 to design the well treatment system, but the public comment period on the plan, which the county initiated on its own, does not end until Oct. 18.

The county is proposing several methods to comply with the water board's order, including pumping and cleaning the water and then putting it back into the ground, a
