II. BUSINESS ITEM

A. BUDGET TRANSFER

Mr. Manning stated Watermaster reviews invoice monthly and meets with WEI on a quarterly basis to review task orders and progress on projects including funding. In reviewing these items, it was noted some changes needed to be made in the way of how funds will be distributed. There are four areas where we anticipate less activity and then were three areas where additional money will be needed; the budget transfer is to cover the areas that need additional funds. The budget transfer document which is included in the meeting packet explains all the details of this transfer.

Motion by DeLoach, second by Moorrees, and by unanimous vote — Non-Ag concurred Moved to approve the Budget Transfer T-09-02-01 relating to: OBMP, HCMP, Desalters, Storage Program to Groundwater Level Monitoring Program, Recharge Master Plan, and MZ-3, as presented

B. AUCTION PRICE FLOOR AGREEMENT AND STORAGE & RECOVERY AGREEMENT

Mr. Manning stated staff and counsel are asking for two recommendations; 1) To review the approval of the auction price floor agreement which is included in the meeting package and, 2) Direct staff to prepare the storage and recovery agreement which is included in the meeting package in draft form. Mr. Manning described the changes in the agreement. Mr. Kinsey was particularly concerned about the equity of having the buyers pay enough to enjoy the benefits of the lower loss rates. Mr. Kinsey wants to know how Watermaster staff got the \$25 acre-feet financial equivalent to go from 6% to 2%. Mr. Kinsey wants to know what has Western

Municipal Water District (WMWD) contributed to waive the equivalency payment and thinks that Watermaster staff has a responsibility to justify this amount. Mr. Manning stated that Watermaster staff did produce this information and it's up to the Parties to accept or reject it. Mr. Kinsey's stated his main point is that the fee needs to be validated. Mr. Manning stated the amounts listed are what staff thinks is fair. Mr. Kinsey noted that it is not exportable water according to the Judgment and that it is bad precedent to export water when the yield is declining along with current drought conditions. A discussion regarding export ensued. Mr. Jeske requested Watermaster staff to prepare a detailed Gantt chart regarding the process of auction timing and the use of the revenue. Mr. Manning stated staff will put together that chart. Mr. Zvirbulis presented a financial analysis which was prepared by Cucamonga Valley Water District which states that there could be almost \$70 million in present value benefits after \$30 million are spent on new recharge projects. Mr. Vanden Heuvel inquired if Western Municipal Water District indicated that they will buy all the water. Mr. Manning stated initially yes but recently they are looking for some flexibility. Mr. Kinsey inquired if the finding of broad regional benefit would include how the money will be used. Counsel and staff agreed to prepare a draft finding of broad regional benefit. Mr. Garibay inquired about taxes and any are assessed, the buyer should pay tax. Counsel Fife stated he would look into that statement in the documents. A lengthy discussion regarding the auction floor price, procedures, and possible outcome ensued. Mr. Manning stated this will not be the last time this will be brought before this committee; staff is attempting to get this item moving through the long process.

III. REPORTS/UPDATES

WATERMASTER GENERAL LEGAL COUNSEL REPORT

Court Hearing

Counsel Fife stated a court hearing took place last Monday and a notice of the hearing has not been sent out yet. After we receive the transcript a notice can then go out to the parties. Watermaster staff has been told by Judge Wade's clerk that the transcript should be ready tomorrow; once that is received counsel will put out a notice that will summarize the orders by the court that were made through the course of the hearing. Staff has contacted the court reporter and negotiated a deal so that Watermaster can distribute copies of the transcript. The court asked for another hearing which was scheduled for April 16, 2009. Counsel Fife noted April 16th conflicts with Mr. Wildermuth and staff schedule. Counsel is going to file a pleading today asking the court to provide us with a different date for the hearing. Once a new hearing date is scheduled a notice as to the new date will go out. Counsel Fife stated it appears Judge Wade will want a series of hearings to review sections of information at a time.

2. Dry Year Yield Agreement

Counsel Fife stated through the agreement with Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) and Metropolitan Water District (MWD) in order to get the LRP funding for the desalters, Watermaster needs to approve an expansion of the MWD storage account from 100,000 acre-feet to 150,000 acre-feet by September, 2009. Staff has asked IEUA to submit a Storage & Recovery Application which is the same process that was gone through for the first 100,000 acre-feet. Counsel Fife stated after the IEUA application is complete it will go through the Watermaster process, this item was placed under legal reports to let you know it is in the works to come back as a business item. A discussion regarding this process ensued.

B. ENGINEERING REPORT

Engineering Update

Mr. Wildermuth stated staff is working with the Regional Board on the Hydraulic Control Monitoring Program in trying to get the monitoring requirements scaled back. This will take place late this year which means there will still be monitoring obligations early into next year's fiscal year. Mr. Wildermuth stated staff is ramping up for the Production Optimization work Mr. Wildermuth stated Tom McCarthy from the Wildermuth office is heading this project up. Tom is not contacting every single appropriator; he is contacting the appropriators that Wildermuth thinks need help with their production. Mr. Wildermuth asked that the appropriators that are contacted work fairly quickly with Tom on this project so that work can get finished in a timely manner because we are working on a tight time frame.

C. FINANCIAL REPORT

1. Watermaster Budget

Ms. Rojo stated Watermaster is starting on the budget and staff is looking at getting input from the parties. Mr. Manning stated meetings are now taking place with consultants on their numbers in an attempt to start the process in order to get the numbers firmed up for the final budget that comes through the process for approval.

D. CEO/STAFF REPORT

1. Legislative Update

Mr. Manning stated invitations have gone out recently for the Inland Empire Utilities Agency Legislative Reception on March 17, 2009 in Sacramento. This is the same day as the Agricultural Pool meeting and Mr. Manning will be leaving directly that meeting for this reception. Mr. Manning stated this is a very well attended reception. Mr. Manning noted he was in Sacramento over a week ago and met with several legislators to discuss groundwater issues.

2. Recharge Update

Mr. Manning stated the updated Recharge Spreadsheet is not available for the meeting. In January there was approximately 1,800+ acre-feet was captured in the recharge basins and a detailed report will be available at the Advisory Committee meeting later this month. Mr. Manning stated there was a breach in one of the berms at San Sevaine 5 basin and staff is working with IEUA and others to get the repairs love.

Fontana Barrier Study

Mr. Manning stated Watermaster staff has been contacted by a group that is interested in having Watermaster involved as the project manager, with no financial involvement whatsoever, to facilitate a USGS Isotope Study of perchlorate in the north eastern portion of the Chino Basin and the Rialto/Colton Basin. This will help resolve some of the issues in the long standing debate over whether water is moving between or across the fault. Watermaster is interested in participating at this level because it will help develop information that can be used in the modeling that helps us better describe what is doing on that portion of the basin. Watermaster will also be partnering up with other agencies on this study which will be a great partnership to be involved in. A question regarding costs was raised and Mr. Manning stated Watermaster has been assured it will be reimbursed for any and all expenses; an agreement has not been received to date.

Added Comment:

Mr. Manning noted Watermaster had put the word out that it was looking to purchase water from storage accounts to fulfill the replenishment obligation of approximately 20,000 acrefeet. There have been some interested parties and three have given staff a definite yes that they will sell Watermaster water which totals approximately 7,500 acre-feet. There is another party that is still working on this and we should have a decision from them within the

next couple days. Watermaster could be getting between 7,500 and 8,500 acre-feet of our 20,000 acre-feet obligation out of storage; the balance is still being worked on.

Staff has asked IEUA to submit a Storage & Recovery Application which is the same process that was gone through for the first 100,000 acre-feet. Counsel Fife stated after the IEUA application is complete it will go through the Watermaster process, this item was placed under legal reports to let you know it is in the works to come back as a business item.

B. ENGINEERING REPORT

Engineering Update

Mr. Wildermuth stated staff is working with the Regional Board on the Hydraulic Control Monitoring Program in trying to get the monitoring requirements scaled back. This will take place late this year which means there will still be monitoring obligations early into next year's fiscal year. Mr. Wildermuth stated staff is ramping up for the Production Optimization work. Mr. Wildermuth stated Tom McCarthy from the Wildermuth office is heading this project up. Tom is not contacting every single appropriator; he is contacting the appropriators that Wildermuth thinks need help with their production.

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1. Watermaster Budget

Ms. Rojo stated Watermaster is starting on the budget and staff is looking at getting input from the parties. Mr. Manning stated meetings are now taking place with consultants on their numbers in an attempt to start the process in order to get the numbers firmed up for the, final budget that comes through the process for approval. Chair Feenstra noted this item will be discussed during the closed session.

D. CEO/STAFF REPORT

1. Legislative Update

Mr. Manning stated invitations have gone out recently for the Inland Empire Utilities Agency Legislative Reception on March 17, 2009 in Sacramento. This is the same day as the Agricultural Pool meeting and Mr. Manning will be leaving directly from that meeting for this reception. Mr. Manning stated this is a very well attended reception. Mr. Manning noted he was in Sacramento over a week ago and met with several legislators to discuss groundwater issues.

2. Recharge Update

Mr. Manning stated the updated Recharge Spreadsheet is not available for this meeting. In January there was approximately 1,800+ acre-feet was captured in the recharge basins and a detailed report will be available at the Advisory Committee meeting later this month. Mr. Manning stated there was a breach in one of the berms at San Sevaine 5 basin and staff is working with IEUA and others to get the repairs love.

3. Fontana Barrier Study

Mr. Manning stated Watermaster staff has been contacted by a group that is interested in having Watermaster involved as the project manager, with no financial involvement whatsoever, to facilitate a USGS Isotope Study of perchlorate in the north eastern portion of the Chino Basin and the Rialto/Colton Basin. This will help resolve some of the issues in the long standing debate over whether water is moving between or across the fault. Watermaster is interested in participating at this level because it will help develop information that can be used in the modeling that helps us better describe what is doing on that portion of the basin. Watermaster will also be partnering up with other agencies on this study which will be a great partnership to be involved in. A discussion regarding rain flow ensued.

Background

The Court approved the Peace Agreement, the Implementation Plan and the goals and objectives identified in the OBMP Phase I Report on July 13, 2000, and ordered Watermaster to proceed in a manner consistent with the Peace Agreement. Under the Peace Agreement, Watermaster approval is required for applications to store, recapture, recharge or transfer water, as well as for applications for credits or reimbursements and storage and recovery programs.

Where there is no material physical injury, Watermaster must approve the transaction. Where the request for Watermaster approval is submitted by a party to the Judgment, there is a rebuttable presumption that most of the transactions do not result in Material Physical Injury to a party to the Judgment or the Basin (Storage and Recovery Programs do not have this presumption).

Notice of the water transaction identified above was mailed on March 5, 2009 along with the materials submitted by the requestors.

DISCUSSION

Water transactions occur each year and are included as production by the respective entity (if produced) in any relevant analyses conducted by Wildermuth Environmental pursuant to the Peace Agreement and the Rules & Regulations. There is no indication additional analysis regarding this transaction is necessary at this time. As part of the OBMP Implementation Plan, continued measurement of water levels and the installation of extensometers are planned. Based on no real change in the available data, we cannot conclude that the proposed water transaction will cause material physical injury to a party or to the Basin.

Chino Basin Watermaster has a total replenishment obligation (due to overproduction within the Basin) of 20,833.80 AF for Assessment Year 2008-09. Due to the fact that MWD does not expect to have replenishment water available this fiscal year and perhaps not next fiscal year either, Watermaster wishes to use the option to purchase water from appropriators to fulfill the replenishment obligation. Watermaster is taking advantage of the City of Chino's offer to sell 5,085.000 AF of water to Watermaster. The transfer will be made first from the City of Chino's net under-production in Fiscal Year 2008-09, with any remainder to be recaptured from storage. The 85/15 Rule does not apply to this transfer because 85/15 payments and credits were already established in the Assessment Package. This transfer is functioning in a similar manner as replenishment Watermaster purchases from MWD/IEUA.

Gov. Schwarzenegger Takes Action to Address California's Water Shortage

Proclaims State of Emergency, Directs Government to Utilize Resources, Help People

To combat California's third consecutive year of drought, Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger today proclaimed a state of emergency and ordered immediate action to manage the crisis. In the proclamation, the Governor uses his authority to direct all state government agencies to utilize their resources, implement a state emergency plan and provide assistance for people, communities and businesses impacted by the drought.

"Even with the recent rainfall, California faces it third consecutive year of drought and we must prepare for the worst – a fourth, fifth or even sixth year of drought," Governor Schwarzenegger said. "Last year we experienced the driest spring and summer on record and storage in the state's reservoir system is near historic lows. This drought is having a devastating impact on our people, our communities, our economy and our environment – making today's action absolutely necessary. This is a crisis, just as severe as an earthquake or raging wildfire, and we must treat it with the same urgency by upgrading California's water infrastructure to ensure a clean and reliable water supply for our growing state."

The Governor's order directs various state departments to engage in activity to provide assistance to people and communities impacted by the drought. The proclamation:

- Requests that all urban water users immediately increase their water conservation activities in an effort to reduce their individual water use by 20 percent
- Directs the Department of Water Resources (DWR) to expedite water transfers and related efforts by water users and suppliers
- Directs DWR to offer technical assistance to agricultural water suppliers and agricultural water users, including information on managing water supplies to minimize economic impacts and implementing efficient water management practices
- Directs DWR to implement short-term efforts to protect water quality or water supply, such as the installation of temporary barriers in the Delta or temporary water supply connections
- Directs the Labor and Workforce Development Agency to assist the labor market, including job training and financial assistance
- Directs DWR to join with other appropriate agencies to launch a statewide water conservation campaign calling for all Californians to immediately decrease their water use
- Directs state agencies to immediately implement a water use reduction plan and take immediate water conservation actions and requests that federal and local agencies also implement water use reduction plans for facilities within their control

In particular, the order directs that by March 30, 2009, DWR shall provide an updated report on the state's drought conditions and water availability. According to the proclamation, if the emergency conditions have not been sufficiently mitigated, the Governor will consider additional steps. These could include the institution of mandatory water rationing and mandatory reductions in water use; reoperation of major reservoirs in the state to minimize impacts of the drought; additional regulatory relief or permit streamlining as allowed under the Emergency Services Act; and other actions necessary to prevent, remedy or mitigate the effects of the extreme drought conditions.

DWR and California's Department of Food and Agriculture will also recommend, within 30 days, measures to reduce the economic impacts of the drought, including but not limited to water transfers, through-Delta

emergency transfers, water conservation measures, efficient irrigation practices, and improvements to the California Irrigation Management Information System.

Last week, DWR announced that California's severe drought had prevented it from increasing its State Water Project (SWP) delivery allocations for the first time since 2001. This year's allocation as of February is at just 15 percent of SWP contractor's requests. This is only the second time in SWP history that the February allocation has been this low.

The drought conditions and water restrictions are causing additional devastating economic and business losses. Agricultural revenue losses exceed \$300 million to date and could exceed \$2 billion in the coming season, with a total economic loss of nearly \$3 billion in 2009.

Full text of proclamation:

A PROCLAMATION

BY THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

WHEREAS the State of California is now in its third consecutive year of drought; and

WHEREAS in each year of the current drought, annual rainfall and the water content in the Sierra snowpack have been significantly below the amounts needed to fill California's reservoir system; and

WHEREAS the rainfall and snowpack deficits in each year of the current drought have put California further and further behind in meeting its essential water needs; and

WHEREAS statewide, 2008 was the driest spring and summer on record, with rainfall 76 percent below average; and

WHEREAS the Sacramento and San Joaquin River systems, which provide much of the state's reservoir inflow, were classified as Critically Dry for the 2008 water year; and

WHEREAS in the second year of this continuous drought, on June 4, 2008, I issued an Executive Order proclaiming a statewide drought, and I ordered my administration to begin taking action to address the water shortage; and

WHEREAS because emergency conditions existed in the Central Valley in the second year of the drought, I issued an Emergency Proclamation on June 12, 2008, finding that conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property existed in the counties of Sacramento, San Joaquin, Stanislaus, Merced, Madera, Fresno, Kings, Tulare, and Kern caused by severe drought conditions, and I ordered my administration to take emergency action to assist the Central Valley; and

WHEREAS the drought conditions and water delivery limitations identified in my prior Executive Order and Emergency Proclamation still exist, and have become worse in this third year of drought, creating emergency conditions not just in the Central Valley, but throughout the State of California, as the adverse environmental, economic, and social impacts of the drought cause widespread harm to people, businesses, property, communities, wildlife and recreation; and

WHEREAS despite the recent rain and snow, the three year cumulative water deficit is so large there is only a 15 percent chance that California will replenish its water supply this year; and

WHEREAS in the time since the state's last major drought in 1991, California added 9 million new residents, experienced a significant increase in the planting of permanent, high-value crops not subject to fallowing, and was subjected to new biological opinions that reduced the flexibility of water operations throughout the year; and

WHEREAS because there is no way to know when the drought will end, further urgent action is needed to address the water shortage and protect the people and property in California; and

WHEREAS rainfall levels statewide for the 2008-2009 water year are 24 percent below average as of the February 1, 2009 measurement; and

WHEREAS the second snow pack survey of the 2009 winter season indicated that snow pack water content is 39 percent below normal; and

WHEREAS as of February 23, 2009, storage in the state's reservoir system is at a historic low, with Lake Oroville 70 percent below capacity, Shasta Lake 66 percent below capacity, Folsom Lake 72 percent below capacity, and San Luis Reservoir 64 percent below capacity; and

WHEREAS low water levels in the state's reservoir system have significantly reduced the ability to generate hydropower, including a 62 percent reduction in hydropower generation at Lake Oroville from October 1, 2008 to January 31, 2009; and

WHEREAS a biological opinion issued by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service on December 15, 2008, imposed a 30 percent restriction on water deliveries from the State Water Project and the Central Valley Project to protect Delta Smelt; and

WHEREAS State Water Project water allocations have now been reduced to 15 percent of requested deliveries, matching 1991 as the lowest water allocation year in State Water Project history, and Central Valley Project water allocations for agricultural users have now been reduced to zero; and

WHEREAS the lack of water has forced California farmers to abandon or leave unplanted more than 100,000 acres of agricultural land; and

WHEREAS California farmers provide nearly half of the fresh fruits, nuts and vegetables consumed by Americans, and the crop losses caused by the drought will increase food prices, which will further adversely impact families and economies throughout California and beyond our borders; and

WHEREAS agricultural revenue losses exceed \$300 million to date and could exceed \$2 billion in the coming season, with a total economic loss of nearly \$3 billion in 2009; and

WHEREAS it is expected that State Water Project and Central Valley Project water delivery reductions will cause more than 80,000 lost jobs; and

WHEREAS the income and job losses will adversely impact entire communities and diverse sectors of the economy supported by those jobs and income, including the housing market and commercial business; and

WHEREAS these conditions are causing a loss of livelihood for many thousands of people, an inability to provide for families, and increased harm to the communities that depend on them; and

WHEREAS this loss of income and jobs will increase the number of defaults, foreclosures and bankruptcies, and will cause a loss of businesses and property at a time when Californians are already struggling with a nationwide and worldwide economic downturn; and

WHEREAS the Central Valley town of Mendota, as one example, already reports an unemployment rate of more than 40 percent and lines of a thousand or more for food distribution; and

WHEREAS when jobs, property and businesses are lost, some families will move away from their communities, causing further harm to local economies, lower enrollments in local schools and reduced funding for schools; and

WHEREAS at least 18 local water agencies throughout the state have already implemented mandatory water conservation measures, and 57 agencies have implemented other water conservation programs or restrictions on water deliveries, with many agencies considering additional rationing and water supply reductions in 2009; and

WHEREAS the lack of water has forced local communities to draw water from their emergency water reserves, putting communities at risk of further catastrophe if emergency reserves are depleted or cut off; and

WHEREAS the state recently endured one of its worst wildfire seasons in history and the continuing drought conditions increase the risk of devastating fires and reduced water supplies for fire suppression; and

WHEREAS on February 26, 2009, the United States Department of Agriculture and the United States Department of Interior created a Federal Drought Action Team to assist California to minimize the social, economic, and environmental impacts of the current drought; and

WHEREAS the circumstances of the severe drought conditions, by reason of their magnitude, are beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment and facilities of any single county, city and county, or city and require the combined forces of a mutual aid region or regions to combat; and

WHEREAS under the provisions of section 8558(b) of the California Government Code, I find that conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property exist in California caused by the current and continuing severe drought conditions and water delivery restrictions.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ARNOLD SCHWARZENEGGER, Governor of the State of California, in accordance with the authority vested in me by the California Constitution and the California Emergency Services Act, and in particular California Government Code sections 8625 and 8571, HEREBY PROCLAIM A STATE OF EMERGENCY to exist in California.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that all agencies of the state government utilize and employ state personnel, equipment and facilities for the performance of any and all activities consistent with the direction of the California Emergency Management Agency (CalEMA) and the State Emergency Plan.

I FURTHER DIRECT THAT:

- 1. The California Department of Water Resources (DWR) shall, in partnership with other appropriate agencies, launch a statewide water conservation campaign calling for all Californians to immediately decrease their water use.
- 2. DWR shall implement the relevant mitigation measures identified in the Environmental Water Account Environmental Impact Report, Environmental Impact Statement, Supplement, and Addendums for the water transfers made through the 2009 Drought Water Bank. In addition, the California Air Resources Board shall, in cooperation with DWR and other agencies, expedite permitting and development of mitigation measures related to air quality impacts which may result from groundwater substitution transfers.
- 3. DWR and the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) shall expedite the processing of water transfers and related efforts by water users and suppliers that cannot participate in the 2009 Drought

Water Bank, provided the water users and suppliers can demonstrate that the transfer will not injure other legal users of water or cause unreasonable effects on fish and wildlife.

- 4. The SWRCB shall expedite the processing and consideration of the request by DWR for approval of the consolidation of the places of use and points of diversion for the State Water Project and federal Central Valley Project to allow flexibility among the projects and to facilitate water transfers and exchanges.
- 5. DWR shall implement short-term efforts to protect water quality or water supply, such as the installation of temporary barriers in the Delta or temporary water supply connections.
- 6. The SWRCB shall expedite the processing and consideration of requests by DWR to address water quality standards in the Delta to help preserve cold water pools in upstream reservoirs for salmon preservation and water supply.
- 7. To the extent allowed by applicable law, state agencies within my administration shall prioritize and streamline permitting and regulatory compliance actions for desalination, water conservation and recycling projects that provide drought relief.
- 8. The Department of General Services shall, in cooperation with other state agencies, immediately implement a water use reduction plan for all state agencies and facilities. The plan shall include immediate water conservation actions and retrofit programs for state facilities. A moratorium shall be placed on all new landscaping projects at state facilities and on state highways and roads except for those that use water efficient irrigation, drought tolerant plants or non-irrigated erosion control.
- 9. As a condition to receiving state drought financial assistance or water transfers provided in response to this emergency, urban water suppliers in the state shall be required to implement a water shortage contingency analysis, as required by California Water Code section 10632. DWR shall offer workshops and technical assistance to any agency that has not yet prepared or implemented the water shortage contingency analysis required by California law.
- 10. DWR shall offer technical assistance to agricultural water suppliers and agricultural water users, including information on managing water supplies to minimize economic impacts, implementing efficient water management practices, and using technology such as the California Irrigation Management Information System (CIMIS) to get the greatest benefit from available water supplies.
- 11. The Department of Public Health shall evaluate the adequacy of emergency interconnections among the state's public water systems, and provide technical assistance and continued financial assistance from existing resources to improve or add interconnections.
- 12. DWR shall continue to monitor the state's groundwater conditions, and shall collect groundwater-level data and other relevant information from water agencies, counties, and cities. It is requested that water agencies, counties and cities cooperate with DWR by providing the information needed to comply with this Proclamation.
- 13. DWR and the Department of Food and Agriculture shall recommend, within 30 days from the date of this Proclamation, measures to reduce the economic impacts of the drought, including but not limited to, water transfers, through-Delta emergency transfers, water conservation measures, efficient irrigation practices, and improvements to CIMIS.

- 14. The Department of Boating and Waterways shall recommend, within 30 days from the date of this Proclamation, and in cooperation with the Department of Parks and Recreation, measures to reduce the impacts of the drought conditions to water-based recreation, including but not limited to, the relocation or extension of boat ramps and assistance to marina owners.
- 15. The Labor and Workforce Development Agency shall recommend, within 30 days from the date of this Proclamation, measures to address the impact of the drought conditions on California's labor market, including but not limited to, identifying impacted areas, providing one-stop service, assisting employers and workers facing layoffs, and providing job training and financial assistance.
- 16. DWR and the Department of Food and Agriculture shall be the lead agencies in working with the Federal Drought Action Team to coordinate federal and state drought response activities.
- 17. The emergency exemptions in Public Resources Code sections 21080(b)(3), 21080(b)(4) and 21172, and in California Code of Regulations, title 14, section 15269(c), shall apply to all actions or efforts consistent with this Proclamation that are taken to mitigate or respond to this emergency. In addition, Water Code section 13247 is suspended to allow expedited responses to this emergency that are consistent with this Proclamation. The Secretary for the California Environmental Protection Agency and the Secretary for the California Natural Resources Agency shall determine which efforts fall within these exemptions and suspension, ensuring that these exemptions and suspension serve the purposes of this Proclamation while protecting the public and the environment. The Secretaries shall maintain on their web sites a list of the actions taken in reliance on these exemptions and suspension.
- 18. By March 30, 2009, DWR shall provide me with an updated report on the state's drought conditions and water availability. If the emergency conditions have not been sufficiently mitigated, I will consider issuing additional orders, which may include orders pertaining to the following:
 - (a) institution of mandatory water rationing and mandatory reductions in water use;
 - (b) reoperation of major reservoirs in the state to minimize impacts of the drought;
 - (c) additional regulatory relief or permit streamlining as allowed under the Emergency Services Act; and
 - (d) other actions necessary to prevent, remedy or mitigate the effects of the extreme drought conditions.

I FURTHER REQUEST THAT:

- 19. All urban water users immediately increase their water conservation activities in an effort to reduce their individual water use by 20 percent.
- 20. All agricultural water suppliers and agricultural water users continue to implement, and seek additional opportunities to immediately implement, appropriate efficient water management practices in order to minimize economic impacts to agriculture and make the best use of available water supplies.
- 21. Federal and local agencies also implement water use reduction plans for facilities within their control, including immediate water conservation efforts.

I FURTHER DIRECT that as soon as hereafter possible, this proclamation be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State and that widespread publicity and notice be given of this proclamation.

Water watchers cast a wary eye

Water experts are having a hard time finding the right words to describe what lies ahead, after recording a dismally dry January in California.

"Scary," "grim," and possible "conservation mandates" are offered up.

Yet it's easy for the experts to sound out a clear warning: This may become, simply, the worst drought California has ever seen.

"Our worst fears appear to be materializing," said Wendy Martin, drought coordinator at the state Department of Water Resources. "It's going to be a huge challenge."

The bottom line, water officials said, is that right now, everyone must start using less water. The public can expect higher water bills and fines if they don't, because the alternative is a real water shortage – one that is threatening tens of thousands of Valley jobs.

"It's pretty scary," said Tim Quinn, executive director of the Association of California Water Agencies, who has more than three decades in the water-supply business. "The public needs to tighten their belts. You have to rearrange all the molecules in your brain to think about using water differently."

What worries the water gurus is not just a likelihood that 2009 may be a third dry year in a row, but what appears to be the state's dramatically reduced flexibility to respond.

Among the reasons:

- Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta is in an ecological crisis. It's the funnel for most of California's precipitation, but its ability to move water from north to south is compromised by the need to keep Delta fish from going extinct.
- California has added 10 million people since the last big drought in 1991, substantially boosting demand on the available supply.
- Farmers have shifted hundreds of thousands of acres to permanent crops such as fruit, nuts and grapes, which cannot be fallowed in droughts like the row crops they replaced.

Thousands of acres of row crops already have been fallowed, and more will follow.

"The situation is very grim for all farmers," said Sarah Woolf, spokeswoman for the San Joaquin Valley's giant Westlands Water District, which warned customers they may not get any water this year. "There simply will be drastic fallowing and, in all likelihood, significant impacts that result in some businesses not making it through."

Richard Howitt, professor of resource economics at UC Davis, last week offered sobering numbers to the state Board of Food and Agriculture.

Using computer economic models and DWR water data, Howitt estimates 40,000 jobs will be lost, along with \$1.15 billion in income.

But this is just the first splash of trouble, because Howitt's estimate applies only to areas of the Central Valley south of the Delta, and only in the farm sector.

It also relies upon DWR's most recent official estimate that its water contractors will get only 15 percent of normal deliveries. But a DWR official told The Bee last week that the next forecast, expected by mid-February, will almost certainly promise even less water.

All these factors mean the statewide economic impacts will increase substantially from current estimates, Howitt said. He expects this drought will be worse than those in 1977 and 1991, the most severe in modern times.

"What's eye-popping to me is these job losses," Howitt said. "If you say you're losing 40,000 jobs in small Valley towns where the people who are losing their jobs are least able to do anything about it, you're talking about real costs to people's living."

January is one of the months water officials had hoped would yield enough water to pull the state out of a two-year dry spell. But it did the opposite: January, often the wettest month of the year in California, was in 2009 one of the driest on record.

The statewide snowpack, in surveys conducted Thursday, proved to be just 61 percent of average. It was worse, at 49 percent, in the Northern Sierra, home to some of the state's most important reservoirs.

Rainfall totals mirror the bad news. Sacramento in January saw just 1.5 inches of rain, against the historical average of 4.2 inches, according to the National Weather Service.

Redding fared even worse, recording only 0.93 of an inch compared with the January average of 6.5 inches.

Water agencies throughout the state are scrambling to adopt conservation mandates – largely because many customers have so far failed to cut back enough on their use.

The East Bay Municipal Utility District, for instance, ordered 15 percent mandatory conservation in May. Customers achieved 10 percent.

The city of Folsom last year adopted the Sacramento region's strictest measures: a Stage 2 drought alert with a voluntary 20 percent conservation target.

Utilities Director Ken Payne said customers achieved that goal, but consumption this winter soared above normal.

Within weeks it is likely to move to a Stage 3 warning, which will make the 20 percent target mandatory and limit outdoor watering to just two days per week.

The city gets its water from Folsom Lake, which today stands at 25 percent of capacity. If the water level drops another 40 feet, Payne said, the city could have trouble drawing water from its lake intake.

The city of Sacramento does not expect supply problems because it has ample water rights in both the Sacramento and American rivers. But it has come under growing criticism in recent years for its gluttony.

Sacramento's per capita water use, at 278 gallons per day, is double the state average.

The city was forced by a 2004 state law to install water meters at all customer accounts. But it doesn't plan to do so any sooner than a 2025 deadline.

Critics note an ingrained attitude among many Sacramentans, who believe they can use all the water they want because it simply flows back into local rivers.

That perception is false, according to state data.

In the Sacramento Valley, an average of 44 percent of water used for urban purposes is lost to evaporation and plant growth, according to DWR research. This means that in an average year, 312,000 acre-feet of water used in the region doesn't return to rivers. That's enough to serve 600,000 households for a year.

Sacramento has never ordered water rationing in its 160-year history. But Utilities Department spokeswoman Jessica Hess said that on Feb. 24, the City Council will consider such a mandate, along with stronger enforcement against water waste.

"It is not just about us," Hess said in an e-mail. "In times like these, it is important to consider the greater good of the state and region."
