Chair Willis called the Watermaster Board meeting to order at 11:00 a.m.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

AGENDA - ADDITIONS/REORDER

Mr. Manning stated there is a correction to the proposed minutes for Item D for the motion and the second; when the minutes are approved it will be with the changed names for the motion. Mr. Manning stated there will be a discussion regarding the county negotiations and it was anticipated there would be a tentative agreement for the parties to review today; however, it is not yet completed so there is no need to call a closed session.

I. CONSENT CALENDAR

A. MINUTES

Motion by Kuhn, second by Camacho, and by unanimous vote

Item B was pulled for a separate discussion and motion. A lengthy discussion regarding the financial report items and why they were pulled ensued. Mr. Manning noted he is working with Watermaster's CFO to have the financials presented to the Pools, Advisory Committee, and Watermaster Board in a different format which will provide more detailed information than in the past which should alleviate some or all questions; this new format will show up on the August agenda packages. Mr. Kuhn offered comment on allowing the other parties, who are not in the process of suing Watermaster, to see the bills in question. Counsel Slater stated the issue is not the inspection of the bills, and what staff intends to do is present a policy whereby the bills can be inspected. The issue currently is the distribution of the bills to the parties in which some are receiving the bills in full and others are receiving them redacted. A policy is being created so that all parties can inspect the bills at the Chino Basin Watermaster office. A discussion regarding this matter ensued.

Motion by Kuhn, second by Camacho, and by majority vote – Non-Agricultural Pool voted no and the Agricultural Pool voted no

Moved to approve Consent Calendar item B, as presented

II. BUSINESS ITEMS

A. SUMMARIZED MINUTES

Mr. Manning stated this item was added at the request of Director Vanden Heuvel last month. The minutes being presented the last few months have been motions only and the cost for verbatim minutes was presented during the budget process. Director Vanden Heuvel commented at the last meeting more than motions need to be in the records and wanted to present having the minutes done in summarization format as has been done for the past several years. Other parties have changed their minutes to summarization format and the Non-Agricultural Pool continues to only want motions presented in their minutes. Mr. Manning stated

staff will write summarized minutes without reflection of opinions and the tapes will remain available to all parties.

Motion by Pierson, second by Haughey, and by unanimous vote

Moved to approve minute format back to summary format, as presented

III. REPORTS/UPDATES

A. WATERMASTER GENERAL LEGAL COUNSEL REPORT

1. CDA Facilitation

Counsel Slater stated staff and counsel have been working with members of the CDA and the expansion groups in an effort to try to bring closure to the agreements that were required for the Phase II Expansion of the Chino Basin Desalters. Several meetings have taken place with all of the parties involved including their lawyers and consultants. Counsel Slater stated it appears the parties seem poised to reach an agreement on all of the substantive terms among the parties; the issues of deal structure, timing, payment, and all key material terms among the parties appear to be done. There is a drafting exercise which needs to catch up with the dialog that has taken place within the group. Counsel Slater stated it is anticipated parties will see the first draft of the underlying agreements in the August Board agenda package. Counsel Slater reminded the Watermaster members that they are not a signatory to the agreement; however, parties want to be ensured progress is being made. Counsel Slater reviewed some of the further external obligations that need to be addressed; this should all be ultimately worked out. Counsel Slater offered comment on the concerns of possible subsidence and on water quality issues. Counsel Slater offered comment on issues regarding the Recharge Master Plan and noted he is confident there will be resolve to all the issues. Counsel Slater also noted that in August there will be completion on documentation.

2. Non-Agricultural Pool Volume Vote Changes

Counsel Slater stated there is ongoing dialog presently between the Non-Agricultural Pool and staff. The report from the Advisory Committee is the Non-Agricultural Pool would like to seek an amendment in their Pooling Plan and specifically the way in which the volume vote is calculated. The change would parallel and/or mirror the Appropriative Pool's volume vote. The Non-Agricultural Pool would like to accomplish this change as quickly as possible and have it put through the Watermaster process, and for Watermaster to make the request on their behalf to amend the Judgment so that their Pooling Plan would be conformed in a way to address this change in the their internal voting. Counsel Slater stated this is an item that this Board would need to refer into the Watermaster process and comes to you from the Non-Agricultural Pool as their request. Staff and counsel feel it is completely appropriate to refer it into the Watermaster process. Counsel Slater stated if Watermaster is making the request, the Board will have to authorize counsel to file a pleading to amend the Judgment which is an amendment to the Pooling Plan. If the Board was not to do this, then the Non-Agricultural Pool would have to file its own request to amend the Judgment. After this item has gone through the Watermaster process and it comes back to this Board with unanimous support, it makes the Board's job much easier than having a split house in having the decision if the Pooling Plan should be amended. Counsel Slater stated an action or motion is needed to refer this subject back through the Watermaster process.

Motion by Sage, second by Pierson, and by unanimous vote

Moved to approve to put the new Non-Agricultural Pool volume vote changes and authorize to put through the Watermaster process for recommendation, as presented

B. ENGINEERING REPORT

Presentation on the Achievement of Hydraulic Control and the Potential for Land Subsidence

Mr. Manning introduced Mr. Malone's presentation and noted this is a report that was requested by the Agricultural Pool. This same report was given at the recent Agricultural Pool meeting this month. Staff felt it important to bring it to the Advisory Committee and Watermaster Board since it was requested in part by Director Vanden Heuvel. Mr. Malone gave the Achievement of Hydraulic Control and the Potential for Land Subsidence presentation which included several detailed graphs, maps, and charts. Mr. Malone stated his objective today is to educate and answer any questions. Mr. Malone discussed what the Regional Board is looking for to achieve Hydraulic Control. A discussion regarding some of the wells in the dairy areas that are going to be eventually developed over ensued. Mr. Wildermuth offered comment on the City of Chino and the City of Ontario who provided Wildermuth a projection of their future pumping needs. Mr. Wildermuth noted a tremendous amount of work and time has been put into trying to figure out how they could best pump to minimize interference. A discussion regarding Mr. Wildermuth' comments ensued. Mr. Manning stated some of the slides clearly show that the problem areas, both from the Regional Board's perspective and from Watermaster's perspective, is in the shallow zone and the need to pump from the shallow zone is where Watermaster has its concern. The deep zone is good for water quality purposes; however, Watermaster's interest is in the upper zone. Mr. Manning commented on the two areas of subsidence that are of concern. Mr. Manning noted one of the most important matters to take away from this presentation is that as Watermaster staff presents future budgets, it will include costs for additional monitoring as we move through this process of the development of the six wells. Watermaster will be part of the monitoring program and will be bringing back information through the Watermaster process including proposals over a series of years to increase our monitoring capabilities in the Chino Creek area.

Added Comment:

Mr. Manning stated Watermaster is finishing up its fourth quarter production numbers and noted staff is still missing approximately five producer's information. This information is needed in order to get the Water Activity Reports out.

C. CEO/STAFF REPORT

1. Legislative Update

Mr. Manning stated there is an article handout on the back table that discusses the bond issues and the delay of the bond. Mr. Manning offered comment on the current activities regarding the bond matter. Chair Willis stated there are many organizations that want to have the bond on the ballot this year because they want to see it defeated, and they are not interested in delays. Mr. Manning briefly discussed a few legislative bills currently being looked at. The California Groundwater Coalition (CGC) has been watching 2304 of which the CGC is one of the co-sponsors along with the Groundwater Resources Association (GRA). That bill has made it through the assembly to the senate committees and is now scheduled to go to the senate floor soon. If this bill passes the senate, it will go onto the governor's office for signature.

2. Recharge Update

Mr. Manning stated the year end recharge data information spreadsheet is provided in your packets. Mr. Manning stated overall this year is characterized as a very good year for recharge despite the problems with obtaining imported water through the Metropolitan Water District. Mr. Manning stated the recharge basins were able to take in over 5,000 acre-feet of imported water; the rate is still not known. The Cumulative Unmet Replenishment Obligations (CURO) was assisted by taking in that imported water. Mr. Manning reviewed the storm and recycled water year end numbers in detail.

Mr. Manning thanked Inland Empire Utilities Agency, Chino Basin Water Conservation District, and the Flood control for their efforts and support this past year.

3. Policy Manual / Database Management

Mr. Manning stated the Policy Manual/Database Management process is going to be starting back through the process. Mr. Manning noted Watermaster staff was directed to bring it back through the process in pieces for review starting in September. Some of the items that will be brought forward came out of the Paragraph 31 Motion discussions. Mr. Manning offered comment on what staff and counsel are going to be working on for a newly revised Database Management plan. Mr. Manning noted for the Appropriative Pool members this should be a fairly easy task, the Non-Agricultural Pool is also not going to be a huge undertaking; however, the Agricultural Pool is going to be the lions share of the work for this project. Mr. Manning noted he has discussed this at the Agricultural Pool meetings and that effort will need to be a joint effort with them, possibly in a sub-committee, due to so many of the Agricultural producers moving, selling wells, etc. In many cases this might including intervening people/parties to the Judgment, as well as purging people/parties from the Judgment.

4. Local Storage Agreement from the City of Fontana

Mr. Manning stated Watermaster is holding a workshop today at 1:00 p.m. on local storage. This issue was raised during, and following, the Peace II process. Mr. Manning stated with the application submitted by the City of Fontana for storage, that opened the door for discussions on a number of issues relative to storage, storage agreement, and losses.

5. October 4th & 5th for Strategic Planning Conference

a) October 3rd – CBWM 6th Annual Golf Tournament

Mr. Manning stated Watermaster will be holding its 6th Annual Strategic Planning Conference on October 4th and 5th locally at the Frontier Project. The Sunday prior will Watermaster will be hosting a small golf tournament and kick off reception at the Sierra Lakes Golf Course. Mr. Manning stated the main topic discussed at the conference will be the implementation of the Recharge Master Plan. Mr. Manning stated discussions will include policy issues, scheduling issues, funding issues, and how we start to move through those subjects.

V. BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS

Mr. Rossi offered comments on the recent activities of the Santa Ana Sucker. Mr. Manning noted there is a current handout on the Santa Ana Sucker available on the back table. A discussion regarding this matter ensued.

Chair Willis offered closing comments regarding this past year's legal issues, personnel issues, auction issues, and overall happenings at the Chino Basin Watermaster. Chair Willis noted Mr. Manning had gone through his CEO evaluation and it was a very good evaluation and he was given tasks to begin and complete. Chair Willis stated Watermaster has a budget for legal expenses which was approved by the parties; however, it appears the budget for legal exceeds the budget amount and asked staff and counsel to compile a legal budget and/or budget analysis for review.





SUMMARY

Issue - Record of cash disbursements for the month of June 2010.

BACKGROUND

A monthly cash disbursement report is provided to keep all members apprised of Watermaster expenditures.

DISCUSSION

Total cash disbursements during the month of June 2010 were \$6,148,608.85. The most significant expenditures during the month were Cucamonga Valley Water District in the amount of \$2,000,000.00, City of Chino in the amount of \$1,861,110.00 and Inland Empire Utilities Agency in the amount of \$1,207,138.14. All three payments were for replenishment water.

SUMMARY

Issue – Record of revenues and expenses of Watermaster for the Period of July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010.

Recommendation – Staff recommends the Budget vs. Actual Report for the Period July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010 be received and filed as presented.

Fiscal Impact – Funds disbursed were included in the FY 2009-2010 Watermaster Budget.

BACKGROUND

A Budget vs. Actual Report for the period July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010 is provided to keep all members apprised of the total revenues and expenses for the current fiscal year. The expense section is categorized into four distinct sections. Those sections are: General and Administrative Expenses; Optimal Basin Management Program Expenses; Project Expenses; and Other Income/Expenses.

DISCUSSION

The Budget vs. Actual report has been created from QuickBooks Enterprise Solutions 9.0, the Watermaster accounting system. The Budget vs. Actual report provided, balances to the supporting documentation in the Watermaster accounting system, as well as the supporting bank statements.

For the year, several individual line items were over the budgeted amount, however, when combining those individual categories into the four distinct sections listed above, the overall expenses were at or well below the budget.

The line item [6010-Salary Costs] was \$4,252 or 1% over the budget as a direct result of the required true-up of vacation, sick and comp-time leave balances at fiscal year end June 30, 2010. The journal entry amount required to true-up the three leave balances on the balance sheet was \$9,059.56

Two of the three Ag Pool line items [8467-Ag Legal & Technical Services as well as 8470-Ag Meeting Attend-Special] were over budget at year end. However, when the Ag Pool expenses were combined in total with line item [8471-Ag Pool Expense], the total Ag Pool expenses were \$13,614 or 7.8% below the budgeted consolidated amount of \$175,000.

The line item [7200-Comprehensive Recharge Program] was over budget by \$52,048 or 4% due to the additional costs associated with this program. However, all other program costs were at or well below the budget, resulting in the overall category being under budget for the fiscal year.

Overall, the total expenses were \$429,884 or 6% below the budgeted amount of \$7,680,788 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010.

Actions:





Background

The Court approved the Peace Agreement, the Implementation Plan and the goals and objectives identified in the OBMP Phase I Report on July 13, 2000, and ordered Watermaster to proceed in a manner consistent with the Peace Agreement. Under the Peace Agreement, Watermaster approval is required for applications to store, recapture, recharge or transfer water, as well as for applications for credits or reimbursements and storage and recovery programs.

Where there is no material physical injury, Watermaster must approve the transaction. Where the request for Watermaster approval is submitted by a party to the Judgment, there is a rebuttable presumption that most of the transactions do not result in Material Physical Injury to a party to the Judgment or the Basin (Storage and Recovery Programs do not have this presumption).

The following application for water transaction is attached with the notice of application.

Fontana Water Company ("Company") has agreed to purchase from The Nicholson Trust annual
production right in the amount of 6.082 acre-feet to satisfy a portion of the Company's
anticipated Chino Basin replenishment obligation for Fiscal Year 2009/2010.

Notice of the water transaction identified above was mailed on June 24, 2010 along with the materials submitted by the requestors.

DISCUSSION

Water transactions occur each year and are included as production by the respective entity (if produced) in any relevant analyses conducted by Wildermuth Environmental pursuant to the Peace Agreement and the Rules & Regulations. There is no indication additional analysis regarding this transaction is necessary at this time. As part of the OBMP Implementation Plan, continued measurement of water levels and the installation of extensometers are planned. Based on no real change in the available data, we cannot conclude that the proposed water transaction will cause material physical injury to a party or to the Basin.


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

Summary

The Non-Agricultural Pool Committee has voted unanimously to amend its voting procedures. After discussion with other parties, the Chair and Vice Chair of the Non-Agricultural Pool Committee agreed to place the item on the agendas of the other committees for discussion during their meetings in August 2010.

Background and Description

At its meeting on May 19, 2010, the Non-Agricultural Pool Committee voted to amend Section 2.09 of the Rules and Regulations of the Non-Agricultural Pool and Section 2 of the Pooling Plan of the Non-Agricultural Pool, by inserting the following at the conclusion of the second paragraph of said Section 2.09 and also at the conclusion of the indented paragraph of said Section 2:

Affirmative action of the Committee shall require a majority of the voting power of members in attendance, provided that it includes concurrence by at least one-third of its total members.

The foregoing sentence is identical to a sentence that appears in the same locations in the Rules and Regulations, and Pooling Plan, for the Appropriative Pool. The motion to amend was made by the City of Ontario, seconded by California Steel Industries, and passed unanimously by the members of the Non-Agricultural Pool Committee in attendance.

Watermaster staff (Ken Manning) and Watermaster counsel (Michael Fife) were present during the meeting. Prior to the conclusion of the meeting, counsel for the Non-Agricultural Pool asked Mr. Fife if any further action would be appropriate in connection with the foregoing amendments. Mr. Fife indicated that a motion before the court might be appropriate. Mr. Fife did not suggest any other action was necessary or appropriate at that time.

On July 13, 2010, counsel for the Non-Agricultural Pool advised Watermaster counsel and staff, and counsel for the Appropriative Pool and the Agricultural Pool, by letter, that the Non-Agricultural Pool Committee had authorized his firm to make a motion for court approval of the foregoing amendments at the earliest practicable date, and asking if they had any objection to such a motion. The motion would be made by the Non-Agricultural Pool Committee, through its own counsel, at its own expense.



SUMMARY

Issue - Preserving diminishing monitoring wells basin wide

Recommendation – Watermaster Board to approve and authorize Chief Executive Officer to execute the agreement.

Financial Impact - No fiscal impact on the Watermaster Budget; there is no cost involved.

Background

Alcoa installed three groundwater monitoring wells in 2000 as part of their requirement to track the migration of a salt plume beyond the former Alumax Fontana site pursuant to Cleanup and Abatement Order 99-38 by the Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB). Monitoring data from these wells indicated that groundwater at these locations has not been affected by the salt plume and in 2008 RWQCB relieved Alcoa from further monitoring. In February 2010, the RWQCB approved the transfer of three Alcoa offsite wells to Watermaster. Watermaster has negotiated the terms of transfer with Alcoa to preserve the wells for on-going regional groundwater monitoring program and has drafted the attached transfer agreement.

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Term Sheet for the Transfer of Well Monitoring Facilities from Alcoa to Chino Basin Watermaster

July 28, 2010

WHEREAS, pursuant to Cleanup and Abatement Order 99-38, the Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board (SARWQCB) has ordered Aluminum Company of America ("Alcoa") to install groundwater monitoring wells in the locations depicted on the map attached here as Exhibit "A" (hereafter referenced as "Monitoring Facilities"). On June 10, 2008 the SARWQCB issued a staff letter to Alcoa streamlining the groundwater monitoring requirements and eliminating the need to continue monitoring Alcoa off site wells AOS-1, AOS-2, AOS-3 at this time. Refer to the attachment for details on well location. A new Order was also issued to the property owner USF Reddaway transferring all requirements relating to the ownership of the property from the Abatement Order 99-38 to the new Order R8-2006-0035.

WHEREAS, Alcoa owns the Monitoring Facilities at these sites, but does not own the underlying property. The underlying property is owned variously by the San Bernardino County Flood Control District and by the City of Fontana.

WHEREAS, Alcoa now wishes to transfer these Monitoring Facilities, specifically AOS-1, AOS-2 and AOS-3 and affiliated facilities, (the "Monitoring Facilities") to the Chino Basin Watermaster to be used by Watermaster in its general monitoring activities within the Chino Basin.

TERMS


Now therefore it is agreed that:

- 1. Alcoa and Watermaster shall cooperate to transfer all easements, rights-of-way, encroachment permits and/or any other agreements held by Alcoa that allow the Monitoring Facilities in their present locations without cost to Watermaster.
- 2. Once the transfers described in paragraph 1, above are complete, Alcoa shall transfer all right, title and interest that it has in the Monitoring Facilities to Watermaster without cost to Watermaster.
- 3. Alcoa will provide Watermaster with all information in its possession with respect to the Monitoring Facilities including, but not limited to, well drillers reports, geophysical logs, well construction diagrams, video logs, and prior monitoring data both water level and water quality collected from the Monitoring Facilities.
- 4. In the event that Watermaster determines that it wishes to abandon, transfer, or destroy the Monitoring Facilities, Alcoa will be given 60 days prior notice in writing and shall have the right to reacquire the Monitoring Facilities under the same terms set out herein.

- 5. Alcoa shall retain the right to perform monitoring activities at the Monitoring Facilities so long as such activities do not interfere with Watermaster's use of the Monitoring Facilities. Alcoa shall notify Watermaster 30 days prior to the desired monitoring event, and Watermaster staff shall accompany Alcoa staff or their consultant during the monitoring event.
- 6. Watermaster takes ownership of the Monitoring Facilities on an AS IS, WHERE IS basis with no warranties of any kind regarding the condition, suitability for any purpose, or any other kind of warranty. Furthermore, Alcoa hereby transfers to Watermaster any rights it may have in the Monitoring Facilities but makes no warranty regarding its ownership or title to the Monitoring Facilities. In order to transfer the wells, the terms of the Certificate of Insurance will also have to be transferred over to the state.
- 7. All necessary activities and costs related to the maintenance of the access rights and to the maintenance of the integrity and effectiveness of the wellbores will be borne by the transferee.
- 8. Watermaster shall not accept any responsibility for liabilities associated with the Monitoring Facilities that accrued prior to Watermaster accepting possession of the Monitoring Facilities. Aloa shall INDEMNIFY AND HOLD HARMLESS Watermaster for any claims or liabilities arising from any action or inaction by Aloa relating to the Monitoring Facilities. Watermaster shall INDEMNIFY AND HOLD HARMLESS Aloa and its affiliates for any claims or liabilities arising from any action or inaction by Watermaster relating to the Monitoring Facilities.





Optimum Basin Management Program

Highlighted Activities

- The Chino Basin Facilities Improvement Project (CBFIP) Phase II, a joint effort of Watermaster, the Chino Basin Water Conservation District (CBWCD), Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA), and the San Bernardino County Flood Control District (SBCFCD) to increase the annual recharge of storm, imported, and recycled water and to reduce long-term maintenance costs, was completed in May 2010.
- The Recharge Master Plan (RMP) was completed in June. Several workshops were held during
 this period. Numerous comments were received and responses were incorporated into the final
 report. The final report was submitted to the Court on July 1, 2010. The plan fully addressed all
 the requirements of the Court and the projected replenishment needs of the Watermaster.
- The Peace II Subsequent Environmental Impact Report (SEIR) was circulated for public review in May 2010. Several meetings were held to review the comments received. The impacts and mitigation measures were discussed during these meetings. A draft of the report is due out in August.
- On June 18, 2010, the Court ruled in favor of Watermaster on the paragraph 31 motion filed by Overlying Non-Ag pool.
- On April 19, 2010, the Regional Water Quality Control Board issued an Administrative Civil Liability Complaint (ACL) to Watermaster and Inland Empire Utilities Agency for not adhering to the adopted schedule for hydraulic control.
- Watermaster purchased 5,000 acrefeet (AF) of imported water from MWD and successfully recharged it in the MZ-1 basins during this reporting period.

Program Element 1: Develop and Implement a Comprehensive Monitoring Program

Groundwater Level Monitoring

Watermaster initiated a comprehensive monitoring program as part of the implementation of the OBMP. The current groundwater level monitoring program is comprised of about 700 wells. At about 500 of these wells, water levels are measured by well owners, which include municipal water agencies, the California Department of Toxic Substance Control (DTSC), the County of San Bernardino, and various private consulting firms. The measurement frequency is typically about once per month. Watermaster collects these water level data twice per year. The remaining 200 wells are private wells or dedicated monitoring wells that are mainly located in the southern portion of the Chino Basin. Watermaster staff measures water levels at these wells using manual methods once per month or with pressure transducers that record water levels once every 15 minutes. The wells in the monitoring

Program Element 1: Develop and Implement a Comprehensive Monitoring Program (Continued)

program within the southern portion of the basin were preferentially selected to assist in Watermaster's monitoring programs for hydraulic control, land subsidence, and desalter impacts to private well owners. The remaining wells are monitored in support of the triennial recomputation of ambient water quality in the Chino-North management zone. The water level data are checked by Watermaster staff and uploaded to a centralized relational database.

Groundwater Quality Monitoring

Watermaster initiated a comprehensive monitoring program as part of the implementation of the OBMP. The groundwater quality monitoring program consists of the following four components:

- 1. An Annual Key Well Water Quality Monitoring Program consisting of 120 wells which are mostly privately owned agricultural wells in the southern portion of Chino Basin that are otherwise not included in an established sampling program. Twenty of these wells are sampled every year; the remaining wells are sampled every three years. The wells sampled annually are for the continuous monitoring of areas of concern associated with the southern edge of the OIA VOC plume, the southern region of the Chino Airport Plume, and the Kaiser Steel Plume which includes the two multi-port MZ3 monitoring wells. Data obtained for the Key Well Quality Monitoring Program are used for the triennial ambient water quality analysis, hydraulic control assessment, the Biennial State of the Basin Report, and to assess the overall health of the basin.
- Annual sampling at nine HCMP multi-port monitoring wells strategically placed between the Chino Basin Desalter well fields and the Santa Ana River. Results of the annual sampling are used to analyze the effect of desalter pumping over time by comparing water quality of the native groundwater and the Santa Ana River.
- 3. Monthly sampling at four near-river wells to characterize the Santa Ana River's influence to nearby groundwater. These shallow monitoring wells along the Santa Ana River consist of two former United States Geologic Survey (USGS) National Water Quality Assessment Program (NAWQA) wells (Archibald 1 and Archibald 2), and two wells (well 9 and well 11) owned by the Santa Ana River Water Company (SARWC).

4. A cooperative basin-wide data collection effort known as the Chino Basin Data Collection

(CBDC) program which relies on municipal producers and other government agencies to supply groundwater quality data on a cooperative basis. These sources include the appropriators, Department of Toxic Substance Control (DTSC), Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB), US Geological Survey (USGS), the Counties, and other cooperators. All water quality data are routinely collected, QA/QC'd, and loaded into Watermaster's relational database.


Groundwater-Production Monitoring

All active wells (except for minimum user wells) are now metered. Watermaster reads the agricultural production data from the meters on a quarterly basis and enters these data into Watermaster's relational database.

Surface Water Monitorina

Water Quality and Quantity in Recharge Basins. Watermaster measures the quantity and quality of storm and supplemental water entering the recharge basins. Pressure transducers or staff gauges are used to

measure water levels during recharge operations. In addition to these quantity measurements, imported water quality data for State Water Project water are obtained from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWDSC) and recycled water quality data for the RP-1 and RP-4 treatment plant effluents are obtained from IEUA. Watermaster monitors the storm water quality in the eight major channels (San Antonio, West Cucamonga, Cucamonga, Deer Creek, Day Creek, San Sevaine, West Fontana, and DeClez), usually after each major storm event. Combining the measured flow data with the respective water qualities enables the calculation of the blended water quality in each recharge basin, the "new yield" to the Chino Basin, and the adequate dilution of recycled water.

Surface Water Monitoring in the Santa Ana River (SAR). Watermaster measures the discharge of the River and selected water quality parameters to determine those reaches of the SAR that are gaining flow from the Chino Basin and/or, conversely, those reaches that are losing flow into the Chino Basin. These bi-weekly flow and water quality measurements are combined with discharge data from permanent USGS and Orange County Water District (OCWD) stream gauges and discharge data from publicly owned treatment works (POTWs). These data are used along with groundwater modeling to assess the extent of hydraulic control.

HCMP Annual Report

In January 2004, the RWQCB amended the Water Quality Control Plan (Basin Plan) for the Santa Ana River Basin to incorporate an updated total dissolved solids (TDS) and nitrogen (N) management plan. The Basin Plan Amendment includes both "antidegradation" and "maximum benefit" objectives for TDS and nitrate-nitrogen for the Chino and Cucamonga groundwater management zones. The application of the "maximum benefit" objectives relies on Watermaster and IEUA's implementation of a specific program of projects and requirements, which are an integral part of the OBMP. On April 15, 2005, the RWQCB adopted resolution R8-2005-0064; thus approving the Surface Water Monitoring Program and Groundwater Monitoring Program in support of maximum benefit commitments in the Chino and Cucamonga Basins.

Pursuant to the Basin Plan and the Watermaster/IEUA permit to recharge recycled water, Watermaster and IEUA have conducted groundwater and surface water monitoring programs since 2004. During this reporting period, Watermaster measured 377 manual

water levels at private wells throughout the Chino Basin, conducted two quarterly downloads at the 125 wells containing pressure transducers, collected 90 groundwater quality samples, and 221 surface water quality samples. Quarterly Surface Water Monitoring Program Reports that summarize data collection efforts were submitted to the RWQCB in July and October of 2009. The Chino Basin Maximum Benefit Monitoring Program 2009 Annual Report was submitted to the RWQCB on April 15, 2010.

Chino Basin Groundwater Recharge Program

IEUA, Watermaster, CBWCD, and the SBCFCD jointly sponsor the Chino Basin Groundwater Recharge Program. This is a comprehensive water supply program to enhance water supply reliability and improve the groundwater quality in local drinking water wells throughout the Chino Basin by increasing the recharge of storm water, imported water, and recycled water.

Program Element 1: Develop and Implement a Comprehensive Monitoring Program (Continued)

The recharge program is regulated under RWQCB Order No. R8-2007-0039 and Monitoring and Reporting Program No. R8-2007-0039.

Recharge Activities. On-going recycled water recharge occurred in the Brooks, 8th Street, Hickory, Turner, RP-3, and Ely Basins this reporting period.

Monitoring Activities. Watermaster and IEUA collect weekly water quality samples from basins that are actively recharging recycled water and from lysimeters installed within those basins. During this reporting period, approximately 271 basin and lysimeter samples were collected and two recycled water samples were collected for alternative monitoring plans that include the application of a correction factor for Soil-Aquifer Treatment determined from each basin's start-up period. Monitoring wells located down-gradient of the recharge basins were sampled quarterly at a minimum, however, some monitoring wells were sampled more frequently during the reporting period for a total of 108 samples.

Construction Activities. Lysimeters and monitoring wells associated with the 7th and 8th Street Basins were installed in the first half of Fiscal Year (FY) 2007/08. There have been no further construction activities since that time.

Reporting. Watermaster and IEUA completed the following required reports concerning the recharge program during the reporting period:

- 2Q-2009 Quarterly Report, submitted to the RWQCB August 2009
- 3Q-2009 Quarterly Report, submitted to the RWQCB November 2009
- 4Q- 2009 Quarterly Report, submitted to the RWQCB February 2010
- 1Q-2010 Quarterly Report, submitted to the RWQCB May 2010

Land Surface Monitoring

The MZ-1 Subsidence Management Plan (MZ-1 Plan) was approved by Watermaster in October 2007, and was approved by the Court in November 2007 which ordered its implementation (see Program Element 4: Develop and Implement a Comprehensive

Groundwater Management Plan for Management Zone 1). The MZ-1 Plan calls for a number of activities with the goal of minimizing or completely abating the future occurrence of land subsidence and ground fissuring in Chino Basin. Some of these activities include:

- Continuing the scope and frequency of monitoring within the so-called Managed Area (southwest MZ-1) that was conducted during the period when the MZ-1 Plan was being developed.
- Expanding the monitoring of the aquifer system and land subsidence into other areas of MZ-1 and Chino Basin where the data indicate concern for future subsidence and ground fissuring.
- Monitoring of horizontal strain across the historical fissure zone.
- Further evaluating the potential contribution of pumping in the central and northern portions of MZ-1 on groundwater conditions in the central and southern portions of MZ-1.
- Conducting additional testing and monitoring to refine the Guidance Criteria.


- Developing alternative pumping plans for the MZ-1 producers that are impacted by the MZ-1 Plan.
- Constructing and testing a lower-cost extensometer facility at Ayala Park.
- Evaluating and comparing ground-level surveying and Interferometric Synthetic Aperture Radar (InSAR), and recommending future monitoring protocols for both techniques.
- Conducting an ASR (aquifer injection and recovery) feasibility study at a production well owned by the City
 of Chino Hills within the Managed Area.
- Providing for recovery of groundwater levels.

With regard to monitoring and testing, Watermaster began or continued the implementation of some of these activities called for in the MZ-1 Plan. During this reporting period these activities included:

- The continuation of detailed water-level monitoring at wells within the Managed Area and at wells in central MZ-1. Replacement of water-level-recording transducers at wells where these transducers have failed after about seven years of reliable service.
- Continuation of monitoring and maintenance at the Ayala Park Extensometer Facility. This includes
 monitoring at the newly installed lower-cost pair of cable extensometers within two piezometers at Ayala
 Park to test this technology for possible application in other parts of the Basin.
- Developed a new testing and monitoring program within and east of the Managed Area with the goals of (1) refining the Guidance Criteria, (2) confirming the existence of the Riley Barrier, (3) testing the feasibility of injection in the Managed Area, (4) better understanding the potential for subsidence and fissuring east of the Managed Area, and (5) evaluating the affect of pumping and drawdown on the fissure zone.
- Collected InSAR data from radar satellites during all six months of the reporting period, which will be analyzed for land surface displacement in early 2011.
- Installed new survey monuments across the historical zone of ground fissuring in the spring of 2010.
 Collected vertical and horizontal strain data across the historical zone of ground fissuring during spring of 2010, which will be used to locate high-resolution, horizontal strain measuring devices.

Program Element 2: Develop and Implement a Comprehensive Recharge Program

The theoretical average stormwater recharge capacity of the Chino Basin Facilities Improvement Program (CBFIP) facilities is about 14,000 acre-ft/yr and the theoretical supplemental water recharge capacity is 99,000 acre-ft/yr. Stormwater recharge in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010 was about 14,100 acre-ft. Because of the drought and Delta environmental issues, the MWDSC has been unable to provide replenishment water to southern California since May 1, 2007. Recycled and imported water recharge in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010 were about 7,200 acre-ft and 5,000 acre-ft, respectively. The IEUA and the Watermaster recharge permit was amended in fiscal year 2009-10 to allow for underflow dilution and extended the dilution period from a running 60 months to a running 120 months. The significance of this permit amendment was to reduce the amount of imported and storm waters required for dilution. IEUA projects that dilution requirements will likely be met through 2019-20,

even if no imported water were available for dilution.

The cumulative unmet replenishment obligation was about 4,368 acre-ft on June 30, 2010. The total amount of supplemental water recharged in MZ1 since 2005 was over 52,000 acre-ft exceeding the average annual requirement of 6,500 acre-ft.

Progress on the Recharge Master Plan update continued during the reporting period. Several workshop were held during this period including two workshops that covered the contents of the entire report. Numerous comments were received on the Recharge Master Plan Update draft report: every comment was responded to and was included in the final report. The final 2010 Recharge Master Plan Update report was completed in early June 2010 and was submitted to the Court in late June 2010. The recharge master plan fully addressed all the requirements of the Court and the projected replenishment requirements of the Watermaster. The focus of Watermaster's October 2010 Strategic Planning retreat will be the implementation of the Recharge Master Plan.

Program Element 3: Develop and Implement Water Supply Plan for the Impaired Areas of the Basin; and Program Element 5: Develop and Implement Regional Supplemental Water Program

Construction of the Chino I Desalter Expansion and the Chino II Desalter facilities was completed in February 2006. As currently configured, the Chino I Desalter provides 2.6 million gallons per day (MGD) of treated (air stripping for VOC removal) water from Wells Nos. 1-4, 4.9 MGD of treated (ion exchange for nitrate removal) water from Well Nos. 5-15, and 6.7 MGD of treated (reverse osmosis for nitrate and TDS removal) water from Wells Nos. 5-15 for a total of 14.2 MGD (15,900 AFY). The Chino II Desalter provides 4.0 MGD of ion exchange treated water and 6.0 MGD of reverse osmosis treated water from eight additional wells for a total of 10.0 MGD (11,200 AFY).

During the reporting period, negotiations continued between the Chino Desalter Authority (CDA) and Western Municipal Water District (WMWD) to allow WMWD to join the CDA and to expand the Chino II Desalter by 10.5 MGD (11,800 AFY). The CDA approved WMWD membership in November 2008. Planning and engineering investigations related to the expansion are ongoing. Watermaster worked with the CDA parties to produce a realistic schedule approved by the RWQCB in June. Raw water will be drawn from existing CDA II wells, and possible additional new wells, if needed. In addition, a new Chino Creek Desalter Well Field, required for the hydraulic control commitment associated with Maximum Benefit, will provide additional raw water to the Chino I Desalter, enabling some existing wells to direct production to the expanded Chino II Desalter facility, if approved by the Chino Basin Desalter Authority.

Program Element 4: Develop and Implement a Comprehensive Groundwater Management Plan for Management Zone 1 and Management Zone 3

MZ-1 Management Plan

Because of the historical occurrence of pumping-induced land subsidence and ground fissuring in southwestern Chino Basin (southern MZ-1), the OBMP called for the development and implementation of an Interim Management Plan (IMP) for MZ-1 that would:

- Minimize subsidence and fissuring in the short-term,
- Collect information necessary to understand the extent, rate, and mechanisms of subsidence and fissuring, and
- Formulate a management plan to reduce to tolerable levels or abate future subsidence and fissuring.

From 2001-2005, Watermaster developed, coordinated, and conducted an Interim Monitoring Program (IMP) under the guidance of the MZ - 1 Technical Committee, which is composed of representatives from all major MZ-1 producers and their technical consultants. The IMP was an aquifer-system and land subsidence investigation focused in the southwestern region of MZ-1 that would support the development of a long-term management plan to minimize and abate subsidence and fissuring (MZ-1 Plan). The IMP involved the construction of highly-sophisticated

monitoring facilities, such as deep borehole extensometers and piezometers, the monitoring of land surface displacements through traditional ground-level surveys and remote-sensing techniques, the detailed monitoring of the aquifer system with water-level-recording transducers installed at an array of production and monitoring wells, and the purposeful stressing of the aquifer system through multiple controlled pumping tests.

The investigation methods, results, and conclusions are described in detail in the MZ-1 Summary Report, dated February 2006. The investigation provided enough information for Watermaster to develop Guidance Criteria for the MZ-1 producers in the investigation area that, if followed, would minimize the potential for subsidence and fissuring during the completion of the MZ-1 Plan. The Guidance Criteria included a listing of Managed Wells and their owners subject to the criteria, a map of the so-called Managed Area, and an initial threshold water level (Guidance Level) of 245 feet below the top of the PA-7 well casing. The MZ-1 Summary Report and the Guidance Criteria were adopted by the Watermaster Board in May 2006. The Guidance Criteria formed the basis for the MZ-1 Plan, which was approved by Watermaster in October 2007. The Court approved the MZ-1 Plan in November 2007 and ordered its implementation.

During this reporting period, Watermaster continued implementation of the MZ-1 Plan. Drawdown at the PA-7 piezometer did not fall below the Guidance Level during the reporting period, and very little, if any permanent compaction was recorded at the Ayala Park Extensometer. The ongoing monitoring program called for by the MZ-1 Plan continues to be implemented. Review and revision of the monitoring program for FY 2010-11 was agreed upon by the MZ-1 Technical Committee during this reporting period, and these changes where included in the Watermaster budget for FY 2010-11.

Program Element 6: Develop and Implement Cooperative Programs with the Regional Water Quality Control Board, Santa Ana Region (Regional Board) and Other Agencies to Improve Basin Management; and Program Element 7: Develop and Implement a Salt Management Program

Ontario International Airport

Watermaster continued to negotiate with the potentially responsible parties (PRPs) associated with the Ontario International Airport (OIA). The PRPs have formed a group called ABGL (Aerojet, Boeing, GE, and Lockheed). Watermaster had several meetings with ABGL and their consultants, counsel, coverage counsel, the US Army Corps of Engineers, US Air Force, the Regional Board, and CDA in order to find common ground for a joint remedy for desalting and plume mitigation. Watermaster provided an updated water level and water quality database to ABGL.

In June 2010, Watermaster collected water quality samples at the 12 OIA monitoring wells as part of a split sampling event between ABGL and CBWM.

Chino Airport

Watermaster continued to negotiate with the County of San Bernardino, Department of Airports (County) in order to find common ground for a joint remedy for desalting and plume mitigation. Watermaster coordinated with the County and exchanged pertinent well, water level, and water quality for wells that the County has installed and for wells that Watermaster samples. Watermaster continued to pursue an alternate well location for one of the County's monitoring wells. This alternate location would still meet the County's needs, while saving Watermaster parties the cost of a new monitoring well for the HCMP.

California Institute for Men

The Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB) determined that volatile organic compounds (VOCs) plume were limited to the area immediately adjacent to and downgradient of the source area, and have not migrated, and are not expected to migrate off CIM's property. In December 2009, RWQCB sent a letter of determination

of No Further Action (NFA) to CIM. Watermaster continued to coordinate with the State on a memorandum of understanding that would allow Watermaster to continue to monitor a subset of monitoring wells on CIM rather than being decommissioned.

Perchlorate in MZ-3

Watermaster is participating on the Technical Advisory Committee on a study of perchlorate isotopes in the Rialto-Colton and MZ-3 Management Zones. The project is to be funded by the Environmental Security Technology Certification Program (ESTCP), which is a Department of Defense (DoD) program that promotes innovative, cost-effective environmental technologies through demonstration and validation at DoD sites. Watermaster attended a TAC meeting and reviewed the Well Selection Memorandum: Evaluation of Perchlorate Sources in the Rialto-Colton-Fontana Area Using Chlorine and Oxygen Stable Isotope Ratio Analysis and Depth Dependent Water Quality Data (SERDP Project ER-0942).


Other Water Quality Issues

Watermaster coordinated with GE and their consultants regarding the new injection wells for the GE Flat Iron remediation. Watermaster reviewed the following Regional Water Quality Control Board document: "Directive to Submit a Work Plan and Conduct an MTBE Investigation at the Mountain Valley Express Facility at 3561 Philadelphia Street in Chino, California, UST Case No. 083604075T."

Program Element 8: Develop and Implement a Groundwater Storage Management Program; and Program Element 9: Develop and Implement a Storage and Recovery Program

The existing Watermaster/IEUA/MWDSC Dry-Year Yield (DYY) program continued during the reporting period. All DYY program construction projects have been completed and are currently being used for DYY "take", or removal from storage. As of June 30, 2010 there was 13,400 acre-ft in the DYY storage account and this water is projected to be withdrawn during fiscal 2010-11.


In February 2008, the DYY Expansion Project was initiated by IEUA and Watermaster to evaluate increasing the DYY storage account. The purpose of the DYY Expansion Project was to determine the facilities needed to store up to 150,000 AF and to recover up to 50,000 AFY. The expansion project analysis was completed in December 2008. The expansion project evaluated the technical, financial, and institutional frame work for individual projects to move forward. Negotiations to-date related to actual projects and the amount of expansion have not resulted in any planned expansion projects.

The agreement adopted this month marks an important milestone in our mutual goal of cleaning up the area's contaminated groundwater. Now that both agencies have approved the agreement, West Valley Water District can move forward in lockstep with the city of Rialto to advance a regional solution for clean, safe and affordable water.

Under the agreement, the West Valley Water District will build and operate a treatment system using \$16 million in state and federal grant funding.

By using Rialto Well No. 6, owned by the city of Rialto, and placing the treatment system at West Valley Water District's headquarters, this project is construction-ready. We can put our grant money to work, provide new jobs and bring the highly contaminated Rialto Well No. 6 back on line in just a few years.

This system will effectively remove perchlorate and TCE contaminants that seeped in to our groundwater from industrial activity that began in the 1940s. This treatment center has been needed for decades and means our residents will once again be able to draw from this needed

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water well free of worries about exposure to dangerous chemicals.

Residents of the area deserve access to clean water. It is the responsibility of civic leaders and water purveyors to make every effort to undo what has been done and provide safe, clean water

today and well into the future.

A special thanks needs to go to state Sen. Gloria Negrete-McLeod and her staff for their help on this project.

We have a long road ahead. Our communities face massive challenges removing pollutants and fuels from our groundwater. Through regional partnerships like the one between West Valley Water District and the city of Rialto, we are on the right track to address this challenge.

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Colorado ruling may help Alvarez overturn conviction

CLAREMONT - Former Three Valleys Municipal Water District board member Xavier Alvarez, who pleaded guilty in July 2008 to falsely saying during his campaign he had won the Medal of Honor, is trying to have his conviction reversed.

A federal judge in Denver ruled July 16 the Stolen Valor Act is "facially unconstitutional" in a criminal case against Rick Strandlof, who reportedly lied about being an Iraq war veteran.

Alvarez's appeal of his conviction under the Stolen Valor Act is pending before the 9th U.S. Circuit Court in the Central District of California.

On Tuesday, Alvarez's public defender, Jonathan Libby, said he was sending the three judges a letter citing the Denver case while he continues to wait for

a decision.



"The court seems interested in both sides of the argument of whether or not the Stolen Valor Act violated the First Amendment. It's unclear to me which way they might come down," Libby said.

U.S. District Judge Robert E. Blackburn, who made the decision in Denver, rejected the prosecution's claims that lying about having military medals reduces their significance.

"This wholly unsubstantiated assertion is, frankly, shocking and, indeed, unintentionally insulting to the profound sacrifices of military personnel the Stolen Valor Act purports to honor," Blackburn wrote. "To suggest that the battlefield heroism of our servicemen and women is motivated in any way, let alone in a compelling way, by considerations of whether a medal may be awarded simply defies my comprehension."

Strandlof, 32, was charged with five misdemeanors related to violating the Stolen Valor Act. He made false claims about receiving military decorations and posed as a wounded Marine captain named Rick Duncan who received

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a Purple Heart and a Silver Star, authorities said.

Tiffany Graham, associate professor of law at the University of La Verne, said anything could happen now regarding Alvarez's case.

"The bottom line with respect to these two cases is they're two separate cases in two different jurisdictions where the judges have the authority to interpret the law in two different ways," Graham said.

If there is a split in the decisions, the Supreme Court could get involved, she said.

From reading news reports on the Denver case, Graham said the words "facially unconstitutional" were "pretty big."

"What you're doing is telling Congress, "You need to go back to the drawing board" with the Stolen Valor Act, Graham said.

"It potentially raises a red flag to folks in Congress" about the legalities of the act.

Rep. John Salazar, a Democrat from Manassa, Colo., who introduced the legislation in 2005, said he was upset about the Colorado decision.

"This is an issue of fraud, plain and simple," he wrote in an e-mail. "The Stolen Valor Act has been upheld by other courts, and I am confident this decision will be overturned on appeal."

Libby said he made his final comments to the 9th

Circuit in early November. He said the Denver case statements were "pretty much verbatim" what he had argued before the 9th Circuit.

"I think we're right on the law and the decision from Colorado would seem to suggest we're right on the law," Libby said. "But the three judges from the 9th Circuit will let us know their feelings, so who knows?"

Libby said he did not know when the 9th Circuit would make its decision about Alvarez.

Alvarez was fined \$5,000 and sentenced to three years of probation in the 2008 case. Libby said he had completed his community service, which was required for probation, and he was close to finishing up his probation.

Currently, Alvarez is at Centinela State Prison in Imperial County for defrauding the water district, authorities said. He was forced to resign Oct. 1 because he knowingly registered ex-wife Juanita Ruiz for health benefits with the district from Jan. 24 to Oct. 31, 2007, authorities said. Alvarez was sentenced to five years in prison but prosecutors said he would probably serve half of his sentence.

Libby said he was not sure what would happen, if anything, to Alvarez's sentencing if the 2008 case is successfully appealed because the judge would have seen the conviction when handing down punishment.

Politics and water conservation

The city made great strides with its watering ordinance, but it's about to be undone.

In June 2009, an ordinance limiting lawn and garden watering with sprinklers to two days a week took effect in Los Angeles. Citywide water consumption dropped by more than 20%.

Yet, 13 months later, the ordinance that pushed Los Angeles to the fore of the Western water conservation movement is about to be gutted, having become collateral damage in a roiling brawl over rate hikes and green energy between the City Council and the mayor's office.

On July 6, the City Council sent the utility a neutered version of the lawn ordinance that would allow watering an extra day a week. Last week, browbeaten Department of Water and Power commissioners quietly rubber-

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stamped it. What is being passed off as a tweak looks more like a death knell for one of the best collective environmental efforts made by the citizens of Los Angeles.

The ordinance was instituted for many reasons — regionwide drought, water delivery cuts to Southern California and common sense on the part of then-DWP General Manager H. David Nahai.

Nahai went after lawns because that's where the water is. Roughly half of the water used in Los Angeles goes outdoors, most of that on turf grass, a plant that needs almost constant life support outside its traditional range in rainy Britain.

But not everyone supported water conservation in our frontyards. San Fernando Valley Councilman Greig Smith argued that the ordinance turned lawns brown, and last September, he began publicly flouting it by watering his own yard more frequently than the law allowed. That stunt was overshadowed by a series of highly publicized water main breaks — one so spectacular that the resulting sinkhole swallowed the front end of a fire truck.

We will never know if the leaks of September 2009 were caused by the fluctuations in pressure from the two-day lawn watering regimen. The DWP has historical charts showing that the rate of bursts was nothing out of the ordinary. But last spring, when a USC engineering group released a report arguing that the leaks were indeed exceptional and that the ordinance caused them, the DWP was too embattled to object.

The ordinance's godfather, Nahai, was gone as general manager. So was his successor, S. David Freeman. The DWP sent a new draft ordinance to the City Council incorporating a USC recommendation to spread out lawn watering days. Under this, half the city would have watered on Mondays and Thursdays and half on Tuesdays and Fridays.

The City Council sat on the proposed fix until long after the water department could reasonably be expected to publicize any new rule before the hottest days of summer. And when the council finally acted, it rejected the DWP proposal, instead sending back to the utility a plan by Smith to allow watering three days a week. Cowed DWP commissioners rubber-stamped the proposal last week.

On paper, the Smith plan looks better. The original ordinance allowed automated sprinklers to run two days a week for a total of 30 minutes. The Smith plan allows sprinklers to run three days a week for a total of 24 minutes. Less water! More savings!

Smith sold the plan arguing that the original ordinance led to large pressure fluctuations on the two legal watering days. By having half the city watering on three days and the other half on another three days, pressure would be kept more even over six days. Better for pipes!

But the Smith plan will save water only if people who water more days observe the fine print about watering for less time. This will be unenforceable. Who among us times our neighbor's sprinklers?

By contrast, the original ordinance was perfectly tailored to the collective honor system. With such a narrow window for watering, violators were conspicuous. Compliance became a testament of civic pride, a spirit so strong that last year, fewer than 200 fine-carrying citations were issued as Angelenos conserved enough water to supply Long Beach, Santa Monica, Burbank and Beverly Hills combined.

Will lawns be healthier? Council President Eric Garcetti said he supported the Smith plan because his wife "who is a big gardener for a year and a half" told him that "plants die with only two waterings a week."

But Bob Perry, professor emeritus of landscape architecture at Cal Poly Pomona, disagrees. "Watering twice a week for 15 minutes during the cool hours is better than three times at eight minutes," he wrote in response to an e-mail query. "This will result in deeper moisture infiltration into the soil and less water loss due to evaporation."

Will the Smith plan be better for the city's pipes? The DWP engineers who oversee them say no, while a group of academics from USC says yes. The only take-home truth about pipes in this spectacle has been that they were the murder weapon as city politics killed the original ordinance.

As the law behind L.A.'s conservation milestone joins the steadily rising bone pile of DWP general managers to fall foul of the feud between the City Council and the mayor, the scofflaw Smith has been rewarded. A plan that may or may not work to alleviate water main breaks is being implemented by the City Council too late for the DWP to effectively get the message out. Finally, the steadily ruinous notion that summer lawns should be green in Los Angeles is being reinforced by promoters of a new law that won't achieve that — unless you cheat.

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Water bond now on the bubble

Governor wants measure off Nov. ballot

The \$11 billion water bond that could be removed from the November ballot includes:

\$100 million to help increase the size of the San Vicente Reservoir near Lakeside.

\$87 million in grants for San Diego-area water projects.

SACRAMENTO — Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger recently concluded that a proposed \$11 billion water bond he personally nursed for three years will probably flop in November and has called on lawmakers to take the measure off the ballot and put it before voters in 2012 instead.

There's a problem: He had already counted on voter approval of Proposition 18 and set aside \$1 billion of the money in his pending budget for dozens of new water supply and environmental projects that he now must shelve.

Schwarzenegger could have a bigger headache: Lawmakers may balk at taking the measure off the ballot, even those who opposed it in the first place.

Some lawmakers and water agency lobbyists warn the bond may get wrapped up in negotiations over the stalled budget.

The governor must woo enough lawmakers to achieve the two-thirds majority necessary to pass legislation to yank the bond off the ballot — no easy task given traditional backroom bargaining over the budget and big-ticket items like water bonds.

Some lawmakers who didn't get what they wanted when the bond was put on the ballot are expected to demand concessions before they agree to a two-year delay. Others who simply opposed it may not vote to take it off the ballot unless the overall budget is shaped more to their liking, according to the lawmakers and lobbyists.

The deadline is a moving target, but most say a bill has to pass by mid-August to remove Proposition 18 from the ballot.

"They're going to need to work hard for their votes," said Assemblyman Jared Huffman, D-San Rafael, who favored parts of the bond package.

Taken to its extreme, the maneuvering could result in something neither opponents and supporters of the bond seem to want: Proposition 18 remaining on the November ballot.

The risk for opponents: Despite the governor's concern, voters could approve the massive spending plan. A recent Field Poll showed support for Proposition 18, though a majority of voters were unfamiliar with it.

The risk for supporters: The governor's instincts are right and voter rejection would make it more difficult to pursue a water bond in two years.

Many believe it won't come to that.

But history has shown that virtually anything can be used as leverage in budget battles and some of the players acknowledge that the water bond would be an inviting target.

"I wouldn't be surprised at all," said Assemblyman Bill Berryhill, R-Ceres.

The outcome has fiscal consequences for water suppliers across California, including the San Diego County Water Authority, which is in line for state bond money to help defray its aggressive program to increase local supplies.

The overall \$11 billion bond includes \$100 million to help defray a \$568 million project to more than double the size of San Vicente Reservoir near Lakeside, now in its eighth month of construction. Authority leaders say they are committed with or without state aid.

If bond proceeds fail to materialize, that means a higher costs for local ratepayers.

Local water officials also were looking at a variety of grants in the bond for other supply reliability programs. Up to \$87 million of those grants would be set aside specifically for use in the region.

With the looming postponement, water planners may have to reset priorities.

"This call for delay puts everyone in a state of limbo," said Dennis Cushman, the water authority's assistant general manager.

The bond and its accompanying policy directives were hailed as the most significant advancement in California water planning in 50 years when various interests agreed to the deal last year.

Of statewide importance, bond money would help restore the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, a vital water source on the brink of environmental collapse. Two-thirds of the state's drinking water, including nearly 20 percent of the San Diego region's, flows through the delta.

"That is the water authority board's No. 1 priority," Cushman said. "The crisis won't wait. It won't go away."

Quite simply, the water bond became a victim of the budget crisis. Schwarzenegger and other supporters agreed that the need to close a \$19.1 billion deficit had to be the priority. They concluded that voters

would be reluctant to approve such massive spending — even for water.

Further, Proposition 18 likely would be opposed by the California Teachers Association and the Sierra Club, who objected to the spending and wanted more focus on conservation.

"If it's a bad bond in 2010, it's a bad bond in 2012," said Jim Metropulos, who represented the Sierra Club in the bond debate.

Finally, the state was coming off a good snow year, temporarily easing drought fears.

"It was a reflection of reality," said Senate Minority Leader Dennis Hollingsworth, R-Temecula.

Hollingsworth voted for the bond and supports a delay.

Assembly Minority Leader Martin Garrick, R-Solana Beach, also endorsed the delay, noting the state's bleak cash picture will make more debt a difficult sell. At its peak, the interest payment would be more than \$600 million a year, according to estimates.

Lawmakers who fought against the package say they feel frustrated yet vindicated by the governor's move. They don't want to put the same measure on the ballot in 2012.

"If we're going to pull it, we ought to be able to reopen it and put it on a diet," Berryhill said. "It's not like a fine bottle of wine. It doesn't get better when it's on the shelf for a couple of years."

Many business and farm interests have reluctantly lined up behind the governor, choosing not to gamble with so much at stake. Some environmental groups that support the bond agree.

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Inland Empire water agencies rip fish-habitat plan

CORONA - Inland Empire water agencies' representatives demanded changes to a federal proposal to protect a small Santa Ana River fish during a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service hearing on Wednesday.

The federal government is developing plans to declare parts of the Santa Ana River and other Southern California waterways as critical habitat for the Santa Ana sucker, a fish typically less than 6inches long that gets its name from the way it eats algae and other food. It is listed as a threatened species.

The most immediate point of disagreement is whether the habitat plan should include areas of the upper Santa Ana River, where the fish does not currently live. There are questions as to whether doing so is necessary to save the

species and whether the habitat plan's restrictions would prevent the Inland Empire from using a vital water source.



The Center for Biological Diversity, which has sued the federal government to protect the Santa Ana sucker, considers the fish to be an important part of the regional ecosystem. The center wants a habitat plan that will restore the fish to areas where it no longer lives, such as the upper Santa Ana River and creeks of the east San Bernardino Valley.

"It's a tiny little fish, and if it's not doing well in the river, you know the whole river is not doing well," said lleene Anderson, a biologist for the Center for Biological Diversity.

At present, the only place Santa Ana suckers can be found in the river is a two-mile stretch west and northwest of downtown Riverside, Anderson said.

A critical habitat designation would prohibit activity deemed harmful to the habitat itself, thus adding an additional level of protection for the fish above what would otherwise be mandated by the Endangered Species Act. There

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is a wide difference of opinion between the Center for Biological Diversity and water agencies as to what that would mean in practice.

Anderson said during a telephone interview Wednesday the habitat plan would not ban human development, but it would require greater consultation with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service officials for activities along the Santa Ana River.

Some Inland Empire water officials, however, say plans to restore the fish to upstream waterways is a bad idea. They worry that the habitat proposal could require Inland Empire residents to sacrifice drinking water.

"The potential burdens of the critical habitat designation threaten both the (San Bernardino Valley Water) Conservation District's role in ensuring safe groundwater supplies for its constituents, and the viability of the literally millions of dollars spent, often with consent or specific direction of the Fish and Wildlife Service, to make the Wash Plan a reality," said Melody McDonald, vice president of the conservation district.

McDonald was one of two people who spoke at length during the Wednesday afternoon hearing. The other was Lindsay D. Puckett, an attorney representing Riverside Public Utilities and the Western Municipal Water District, a west Riverside County water provider.

The conservation district's responsibilities include storing Santa Ana River water supplies

underground. It is the lead agency for the Santa Ana River Wash Plan.

The Wash Plan is an attempt to balance mining and natural habitat in the upper Santa Ana River bed near Highland and Redlands. McDonald predicted at the hearing that Fish and Wildlife's habitat proposal could add \$10.3 million to the Wash Plan's mining-related costs over 20 years.

Puckett, however, voiced a much bigger number during her remarks.

The attorney said an economic analysis prepared by Inland Empire economist John Husing predicts area water providers could end up spending \$2.7 billion over 25 years to import Northern California water if the habitat plan makes it impossible to draw water from the Santa Ana River.

Projected water delivery costs also assume that water is available, she said.

The federal government is also considering plans to establish critical habitat zones for the Santa Ana sucker in areas along the San Gabriel River in the Angeles National Forest and in Los Angeles area creeks upstream from Hansen Dam.

Wednesday's scheduled hearings were part of the process required to develop the proposal into something for the rule books. The Fish and Wildlife Service convened afternoon and evening hearings at Ayres Corona Suites West to record

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comments for the official record that will be used to make a final habitat ruling.

A decision is expected by December.

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Cities, agency share study costs

Ontario, Upland and the Chino-based Inland Empire Utilities Agency are sharing the costs to investigate possible contamination surrounding a regional wastewater treatment plant in Ontario.

The Regional Water Quality Control Board alleges that the plant, which treats recycled water, may be a source of contamination.

"In other words, the contamination could have gone into the sewer, went to the treatment plant and potentially got into the ground from the treatment plant," said Mohamed El-Amamy, utilities general manager for Ontario.

The cost to be shared by the three entities ranges from \$100,000 to \$150,000.

The treatment plant, near the 60 Freeway and Archibald Avenue, serves Ontario, Rancho Cucamonga, Upland, Montclair, Fontana and unincorporated areas of San Bernardino County.

The plant was owned from 1934 to 1973 by Ontario and Upland. The IEUA has owned and operated it since 1973.

In the 1990s, the Regional Water Quality Control

Board investigated a groundwater contamination plume consisting of an organic solvent known as trichloroethylene near the plant.

Trichloroethylene is a solvent found in many common household products such as paint r emovers, paint strippers, gun-cleaning fluid, rust removers, adhesive glues and spot removers.

In 2009, the board alleged that the plant was the source of the contamination.

"The groundwater contamination in the area near the plant - that groundwater

initially was thought to originate from industries near the Ontario airport, like General Electric and Lockheed and the Department of Defense," El-Amamy said.

The contaminant has not been found in the water supply, officials said.

"Basically, we don't know whether these allegations are true or not," El-Amamy said. "Obviously, we have to respond. We have to look at records. We have to look at data and better respond once we know."



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Water worries arise

A lack of water into the Inland Empire could dampen future land developments and job growth, industry experts said Thursday at an annual water conference.

"Without an adequate water supply, we will struggle with bringing in new jobs, development, construction and investments into the community," Otto Kroutil, Ontario Development Agency director, at the San Bernardino County Water Conference.

Although the city has an adequate supply of water, the tides may turn with another population boom, Kroutil said.

"All this has to do with the ability to grow," he said.

Kroutil and other agency and business representatives sat on a panel on the water challenges the Inland Empire faces in future land development.

San Bernardino County supervisors Gary Ovitt and Josie Gonzales hosted the event at the Ontario Convention Center, along with the Baldy View Chapter of the Building Industry Association and the Mojave Water Agency.

Developers worry cities will stop issuing willserve letters, or statements required from a water agency that enough water is available to support a new construction project, said Jonathan Weldy, president of Meridian Land Development Co., based in Apple Valley.

He said there are developers of lots in Lancaster that have had trouble gaining approval from cities to build due to concerns about the area's water supply.

With the economic downturn, new developments are few and water is not an issue. But

once construction returns to pre-recession levels, the water supply could hinder gaining approval for new projects in the Inland Empire, Weldy said.

Permits for new housing units in San Bernardino County climbed drastically in number from about 6,700 units to 18,500 units between 2000 and 2004, according to data from the Building Industry Association.

"If we get this kind of growth, we've got a problem," Weldy said.

Last year, the county saw about 2,500 permits issued.

An inadequate water supply has become a threat for Southern California in recent years after three consecutive years of drought coupled with

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a court-ordered reduction in water imported from the Sacramento delta in order to protect a fish species.

Southern California is expected to gain 2.6 million new residents in the next 15 years, comparable to the population of Kansas, according to the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California. The growth could lead to an increase in water demand that the supply cannot meet.

ONTARIO - As the demand for water grows and non-regional supplies decrease, the largest wholesaler in the region is working with local agencies, businesses and residents to cut costs and maintain the reliability of supply.

The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California on Thursday met with stakeholders to gather input for its integrated water resources plan - a 20-year strategy for cutting costs and securing regional water supply reliability.

The meeting at the Ontario Airport Marriott was one of several scheduled for this month.

Officials expect a possible 20 to 30 percent increase in water demand in the next 20 years in California. The loss in supply is due to the current drought and a court-ordered reduction on imported water from Northern California in order to protect a fish species in the Sacramento delta.

The district is encouraging a partnership with water agencies, businesses and residents to increase supply through the building of infrastructure for recycled water and water collection as well as reducing runoff waste

through education and incentives.

Officials are also encouraging customers to use more efficient sprinkler systems and landscape with more drought resistant plants.

"We've been very inefficient with our water," said John Rossi, general manager of the Western Municipal Water District, which provides water to customers in Riverside County. "We use it once and we let it go down the river.

We cant do that anymore."

Water agency officials throughout the region are increasing more water recycling and runoff capturing capabilities in order to reduce waste and improve supply. About 60 percent of all the water in the Inland Empire is used outdoors, of which at least a third is wasted, Rossi said.

The Cucamonga Valley Water District has recently completed the Northeast Regional Recycled Water Project, which includes a vast network of pipes and pump stations to deliver recycled water to customers in Rancho Cucamonga and Fontana.

The water also recharges groundwater basins in the area for future use, said Marty Zvirbulis, district deputy general manager.

"We've made a major investment in the construction of regional infrastructure to deliver recycled water for reuse for irrigation and for the recharge of groundwater basins, the

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improvement of those groundwater basins to improve their capacity so we can reuse every drop of water that is used here," Zvirbulis said.

The public should be aware of the changing nature of water supply and demand in the region, he said.

"Even though people are using less water and trying harder at home to conserve, they are having a hard time understanding why the cost is going up," Zvirbulis said. "This is largely the result of the reliability issues that we have, and the cost of the supplies, and the cost of the infrastructure improvements. Those are the types of things that we're having to do to improve the reliability. Those costs are going to continue to grow over time."

Debra Man, assistant general manager of the Metropolitan Water District, said it was important for stakeholders to partner up in the process.

"When we're coordinated and we use our resources in the most efficient way, collectively, we don't have redundant investments and we're smarter in how we expedite water use efficiency projects and water supply projects," Man said. "There's potentially a cost savings for all of us when we can get together and pool our resources in terms of finances and supplies and benefit the region."

The MWD-led meetings began Tuesday in Orange and continue Aug. 10 in San Diego and

Aug. 12 in Los Angeles.

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Fontana Water Co. announces two-year perchlorate study

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FONTANA - One of the region's largest privatelyowned water companies has reached out to the federal government to study contaminated water.

The Fontana Water Co., a division of the privately-owned San Gabriel Valley Water Co., announced Tuesday that the U.S. Geological Survey has begun a two-year study to identify the direction of perchlorate plumes in underground water flows in Fontana and Rialto, a project that will cost roughly \$262,000.

The study will be paid for by the U.S. Department of Defense's Environmental Security Technology Certification Program, company officials said.

In September, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency placed the 160-acre BF Goodrich site in north Rialto on its Superfund National Priorities List

Perchlorate contamination has been linked to military activity dating back to World War II, fireworks manufacturers and chemicals leaking from the Mid-Valley Landfill. Some scientists say perchlorate could hurt the thyroid gland.

While the Superfund designation makes cleanup work eligible for government funding, water company officials said the EPA's plan is for a small part of the contaminated water supply only, and relies on outdated information supplied by polluters.

"We think it is a disservice to the residents of Fontana for the EPA to propose an interim remedial plan for the perchlorate problem that fails to even address Fontana's need for groundwater cleanup," said Michael L.

Whitehead, president of the company, in a statement.

According to one EPA official, the agency has spent about \$3 million on the cleanup project in the last year.

Richard Hiett, chief of the EPA's California Cleanup Site Section 3, said data collection is an ongoing process. "We're spending a lot of money and a lot time and a lot energy, and we even expressed that in a letter to Mr. Whitehead," Hiett said.

The water company serves about 160,000 residents in Fontana and Rialto.

The company has reported nine well closures because of perchlorate contamination.

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

Because factions in the Capitol can't, or won't, compromise, nothing changes, no matter how important the issue.

And then there were nine. The water bond known as Proposition 18, which was to be the first of 10 measures on the Nov. 2 ballot, has been put off for two years, leaving voters with slightly less campaign material crowding their mailboxes, fewer words in the ballot pamphlet to read and understand, and one less decision to make. That sounds like a good thing. But it's a telling example of the state's political stalemate.

The \$11-billion bond measure would have presented the state with an enormous new debt and new annual service payments — at a time when Californians are grappling with the consequences of past spending decisions. Bonds and pension commitments lock the state into preprogrammed spending for decades to come.



Yet California is in dire need of a plan to break a 40-year-old deadlock on water planning and policy. Factions in the water fight — environmentalists and farmers, the Bay Area and Los Angeles, agribusiness and fishing, Democrats and Republicans — have argued themselves into stasis. Better to let California dry up and blow away, each group often seemed to be saying, than to accept an opponent's plan or to give up anything on its own wish list.

That's what made last year's water agreement so rare. After decades of saying "all or nothing," many (but not all) factions in the water wars responded to Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger's call to cobble together a package that finally moved the state forward. There was plenty not to like; the whole point of a compromise is that everyone doesn't get everything they want. This page offered the Legislature grudging praise for getting the job done — grudging because the bond was bigger than it needed to be and larded with special favors, but praise nonetheless, because lawmakers were doing something that long seemed possible: getting the state out of its perpetual "pause" mode.

Until they reached the water deal, California lawmakers appeared utterly unable to achieve a workable compromise for the common good. Exhibit A is the annual failure to adopt a timely and balanced state budget. Several years ago, Democrats blew a chance to reform term limits, and Republicans missed an opportunity to change the way district lines are drawn, because each side insisted on winning without trading away anything in return. Instead, the state got redistricting reform at the ballot box — and opponents are returning to the ballot this year with a measure to repeal it. Meanwhile, Democrats —

who lost term limit reform several years ago — are trying it again on the 2012 ballot. The attitude seems to be that it's better to try, lose and try again than to compromise and get something done.

Schwarzenegger didn't think the water bond could pass this year, especially if he had to spend so much of his campaign and fundraising resources fighting off Proposition 23, which would suspend the landmark climate change bill he signed in 2006. It's hard to argue with his logic.

But it's also hard to miss the central point of California's dysfunction. We just can't seem to move, because we are incapable of compromise.
