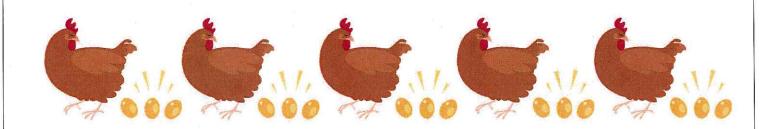








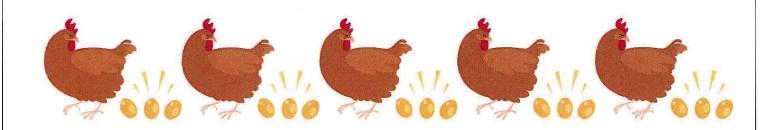

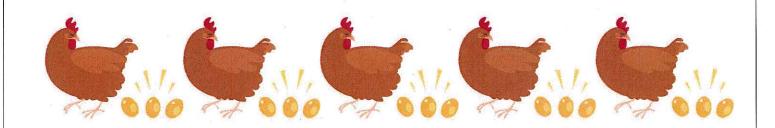

Chair Feenstra called the Agricultural Pool meeting to order at 9:03 a.m.

- Consider Approval for Notice of Sale or Transfer The City of Pomona will transfer 370.000 acre-feet of water to the City of Upland. The water will be transferred from Pomona's Excess Carryover Account to Upland's Excess Carryover Account Date of Application: January 18, 2011
- 2. Consider Approval for Notice of Sale or Transfer On January 20, 2011, Watermaster received Consolidated Water Transfer Forms 3, 4, and 5 with Southern California Edison (SCE) as the Transferor and the City of Ontario (as an Overlying Non-Agricultural party) as Transferee in the amount of 27.959 acre-feet of safe yield as a permanent transfer. Also to be transferred are all of SCE's post-June 30, 2007 stored, carry-over and unpumped groundwater. Date of Application: January 20, 2011

An inquiry regarding a permanent transfer was made. Ms. Maurizio stated it means a permanent sale of their water rights forever.

Motion by Durrington, second by deBoom, and by unanimous vote

II. BUSINESS ITEMS

A. TURNER BASIN EXCAVATION COST SHARING AGREEMENT

Ms. Maurizio stated this item is the Turner Basin Excavation Cost Sharing Agreement and offered comment regarding this matter. Ms. Maurizio noted the City of Ontario will be adding another basin for Chino Basin Watermaster to use for recharge. Ms. Maurizio stated before this work is started some environmental work needs to be completed, some grading permits need prepared, and a possible traffic study needs to be done. Inland Empire Utilities Agency and Chino Basin Watermaster will be doing the 50/50 cost sharing agreement on this endeavor; the not to exceed amount is \$27,680 for Watermaster which includes a potential amount of \$15,000 for the traffic study. Ms. Maurizio stated this is a tremendous benefit to Watermaster. A brief discussion regarding this item ensued.

B. RFP FOR OUTSIDE AUDIT FIRM

Mr. Joswiak stated the Chino Basin Watermaster is required by law to have an annual audit performed by an outside audit firm. The past twelve-years Watermaster has used Conrad & Associates and in 2006 Conrad & Associates was purchased by Mayer Hoffman & McCann, who has done the audit for the last five years. Mr. Joswiak offered comment on our audit service and noted it is time Watermaster sent out an RFP for auditing services. This item is to perform that function. Mr. Joswiak noted the responses could be at a much larger cost for performing the same type of service. A discussion regarding this matter ensued.

Motion by Durrington, second by deBoom, and by unanimous vote

Moved to approve Watermaster staff sending out an RFP for an outside audit firm, as presented

Added Comment:

Chair Feenstra inquired about Mr. Joswiak looking into the Agricultural Pool financial accounts. Mr. Joswiak gave a report on the Agricultural Pool investments and LAIF accounts and how they work. A discussion regarding the financial re-cap ensued.

C. WELL LOCATION OF WELLS I-19, I-20, AND I-21

Ms. Maurizio introduced the well location of wells I-19, I-20, and I-21. Mr. Malone stated that typically Watermaster does not approve well locations; however, given the sensitivity for land subsidence in the area of the Chino Creek Desalter Well Field this project is meant to achieve Hydraulic Control, which is a basin wide program. Mr. Malone stated Watermaster is doing this for the Chino Desalter Authority (CDA). Mr. Malone reviewed a map of the area of the Chino Creek Well Field and explained the map in detail. Mr. Malone stated these wells will be constructed in a way to pump only from the shallow aguifer system which does lessen the concern for land subsidence and will achieve Hydraulic Control. Mr. Malone stated staff is recommending these well locations and they have been approved in prior meetings. A discussion regarding these three wells and their production ensued. Mr. Rees inquired about well I-18. Mr. Malone stated there is an information item on the agenda and that will be discussed in greater detail. Chair Feenstra inquired if 1,200 gallons per minute is adequate. Mr. Malone stated that is an adequate amount to achieve the overall objective of 40,000 acrefeet per year of production from the Chino Desalter Well Fields as a whole. A discussion regarding this matter, drawdown on the wells, and reverse flows ensued. Mr. Malone stated the Mitigation Plan for the private well producers that are impacted by these lower groundwater levels is to mitigate the damage they may experience. Chair Feenstra offered comments regarding this matter and the new Mitigation Plan, impacted wells, and land/dairy usage discussion ensued.

Motion by deBoom, second by Rees, and by unanimous vote

Moved to approve well locations of wells I-19, I-20, and I-21, as presented

Added Comment:

Chair Feenstra inquired about Craig Paxton, who is the new General Manager for the CDA. Mr. Malone stated he does know him and stated he thinks it was a good choice for the CDA to hire him. Ms. Maurizio stated she believes there was a lengthy search process. Counsel Fife stated the CDA is a completely different entity from Watermaster, and Watermaster staff was not involved in any of the search or hiring process for that position. The CDA Board did go through a search process.

III. REPORTS/UPDATES

A. WATERMASTER GENERAL LEGAL COUNSEL REPORT

1. Draft Restated Watermaster Judgment

Counsel Fife stated Watermaster staff and counsel are continuing to work on this project. Counsel Fife stated the text of the Restated Watermaster Judgment is complete and the Exhibits are what is being worked on currently. A lot of attention is being placed on the Agricultural party list Exhibit. Meetings have taken place at Watermaster with a subcommittee of Agricultural parties and Watermaster staff. Counsel Fife stated this subject might have to go to the court before the Restated Judgment is put through the Watermaster process. There needs to be some kind of process for dealing with the Agricultural Pool issues; mainly people who are listed in the Judgment who are no longer around, as well as people who are not listed in the Judgment that need to be intervened into the Judgment. Then some sort of process for going forward to make sure the party lists stay up to date needs to be implemented. Counsel Fife stated there are due process issues that need to be dealt with associated with this matter. After the process has been established and it is taken to court for approval, staff and counsel can move forward with the entire Restated Judgment going to the court for approval.

2. January 21, 2011 Hearing Update

Counsel Fife stated a hearing did take place January 21, 2011, and the purpose of the hearing was to reappoint the nine-member board. There was no opposition to the motion and the court did reappoint the nine-member Watermaster Board for another five year term. At that hearing counsel updated the court on the progress of the Restated Judgment which was court ordered. Counsel Fife stated counsel also updated the court on the CDA Desalter Resolution. The court seemed satisfied with the efforts so far and did not express any concern over the pace. Another hearing was scheduled for April 22, 2011 and hopefully the purpose of that hearing will be to get approval of the Desalter Resolution.

3. January 26, 2011 Settlement Conference Update

Counsel Fife stated this is the Non-Agricultural Paragraph 31 Motion; the settlement conference did take place with the Court of Appeal. There was no outcome from that conference and the court concluded there was no opportunity to settle this issue and that it will have to go before the Court of Appeal for a decision. After that settlement conference an order was issued by the Court of Appeal and a copy of that order is available on the back table. The order orders California Steel Industries and the Non-Agricultural Pool file their opening briefs by March 8, 2011. Mr. Lee stated what Court of Appeal does in Riverside is to issue a tentative opinion so that before it actually goes to oral argument the parties will get an idea of the tentative order is. Mr. Lee explained what a tentative order can look like in detail.

4. Santa Ana Sucker Critical Habitat Designation

Counsel Fife stated the Fish and Wildlife Service did make a decision on the critical habitat designation for the Santa Ana Sucker and they did designate the parts of the River that we did not want them to designate; many people are not happy with that outcome. Counsel Fife stated it is part of the River that goes by Chino Basin and has been designated as critical habitat for the sucker. Counsel Fife stated they have also designated, basically all the way up, all of the agencies up the River including San Bernardino Municipal Water District, the City of Riverside and Western Municipal Water District. They have more problems than Watermaster because Watermaster does not do projects in the River bed itself. Counsel Fife stated there are questions if that is the case, would critical habitat designation affect Watermaster? It is important Watermaster stay involved. Counsel Fife stated we are participating in all the meetings and phone calls and will follow their leads since they are the agencies most affected by this decision. A lengthy discussion regarding this matter ensued. Counsel Fife noted this is a Federal issue so this will be taken to a Federal Court. Chair Feenstra asked if Watermaster staff would put together a presentation by SAWPA on the Santa Ana Sucker and Ms. Maurizio stated she will work on this presentation for a future meeting. A lengthy discussion regarding the Seven Oaks Dam issue with this situation and this entire matter ensued.

B. ENGINEERING REPORT

1. Land Subsidence Committee Meeting Update

Mr. Malone stated he has reported to this pool in previous meetings regarding the purpose and the need for this committee meeting. This is now a basin wide committee and will hold a series of meetings leading up to a recommendation to Watermaster for a scope of work for next year. Mr. Malone stated some of these proposals that are being discussed in these meetings are for a variety of important projects. The first meeting was held last month and was a well attended meeting by parties that are directly impacted by land subsidence and other parties to the north and to the east that are not impacted by subsidence; however, are impacted financially. A second meeting was held at the Wildermuth offices and this meeting was much more technical in nature. Mr. Malone stated Curtis Paxton did attend that meeting which shows he is trying to educate himself on issues that could impact his agency. The next meeting is going to be prior to the Watermaster Board meeting on February 24,

2011, at 9:00 a.m. and then should fall back into its intended time slot of directly after the Advisory Committee meetings every month. A discussion regarding Mr. Malone's presentation ensued.

2. MZ3 Recharge Opportunities Effort

Mr. Malone stated the Recharge Master Plan was updated last year in 2010 and there were a number of recommendations in that effort and report. The Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District has come to Watermaster and expressed some interest in being a financial partner in implementing some recharge projects that would benefit Riverside County, specifically Jurupa Community Services Distinct and the Santa Ana River Water Company. Mr. Malone stated these would be the recharge projects that were recommended in Management Zone 3 area. Mr. Malone stated Watermaster staff, Wildermuth Environmental staff, Chino Basin Water Conservation District staff and consultants came back and refined some recommendations out of the Recharge Master Plan Update in this MZ3 area. Mr. Malone stated this group came up with approximately 5,500 acre-feet of additional recharge, mainly storm water recharge, which could be captured and recharged in that area and came up with some cost estimates also. Mr. Malone stated those estimates would be cost competitive with Metropolitan Tier II rate. Those recommendations and cost estimates are now going to be shared with the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District. Mr. Malone stated he and Watermaster staff will keep the parties apprised on these efforts.

3. Chino Creek Well Field Well I-18 Design

Mr. Malone stated this is an information item which shows the Chino Creek Well Field Well design for well I-18. Mr. Malone presented several slides and reviewed them in detail. Mr. Malone showed a slide that demonstrated the areas that were screened which were in the shallow aquifer system and then showed the screens that go down into the deeper aquifer system; this is not alright with Watermaster at this point in time. They have only been asked to pump from the shallow aquifer system and this was an interesting request from them. Mr. Malone offered a detailed report on how they are proposing to construct the well and the reason why. A discussion regarding cost, construction, water quality, and calculations ensued. Chair Feenstra stated this needs to be followed up on, even on the Board level, to see where we are at on the Chino Plume and what effects it does have on the quality of water at Desalter I. A discussion regarding the plume ensued.

C. FINANCIAL REPORT

1. Expected Cost of Completion Mid-Year

Mr. Manning introduced this item with regard to the past six months of the Watermaster's budget. Mr. Joswiak noted this item is presented in the meeting package on pages 92 through 96. Mr. Joswiak noted this is the second quarter financial review. Mr. Joswiak gave the Expected Cost of Completion Mid-Year presentation and discussed each category item in detail. A discussion regarding the Chino Airport Plume and legal services ensued. Mr. Manning stated when we look at the positives and negatives through the budget half way through the year, even when you include the \$62,000 fine from the Regional Board there will not be any special assessment of the Appropriative Pool in order to be able to make up for all of those funds. Chair Feenstra inquired about what comp time means. Mr. Joswiak stated comp time is an accrual of time and Mr. Manning is allocated 40 hours of comp time each year. Ms. Maurizio stated it's like floating holidays and personal leave. A discussion regarding Mr. Manning's retirement pay, regular Watermaster staff accrued time and the process that will be used to replace Mr. Manning ensued. Counsel Fife stated legal counsel was used when seeking the last CEO, as well as the Mathis Group. Chair Feenstra offered his comments on finding a new Watermaster CEO. Mr. Joswiak continued with his financial presentation. A discussion regarding financial issues ensued.

Added Comment:

Ms. Maurizio noted the ABGL Group will be giving a second confidential showing of their plume presentation on February 16, 2011 at 2:00 p.m. at the Watermaster office for the new Board members and invited guests.

D. CEO/STAFF REPORT

1. Legislative Update

Ms. Maurizio offered comment on the recent State of the State Address given by the new governor and noted the lack of water discussion in that address.

2. Recharge Update

Ms. Maurizio reviewed the most recent recharge spreadsheet in detail. Ms. Maurizio noted Inland Empire Utilities Agency has filed for FEMA relief from some of the damages done in recent storms to a few of the recharge basins.

3. CEO Resignation

Ms. Maurizio stated Mr. Manning is resigning from Chino Basin Watermaster at the end of February and will be starting his new position at the San Gabriel Basin Water Quality Authority, March 1, 2011. Chair Feenstra offered comment on Mr. Manning leaving Watermaster in capable staff/counsel hands.

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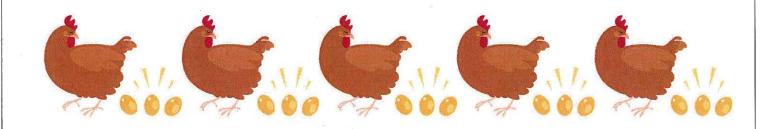

SUMMARY

Issue - Record of cash disbursements for the month of January 2011.

Recommendation – Staff recommends the Cash Disbursements for January 2011 be received and filed as presented.

Fiscal Impact – Funds disbursed were included in the FY 2010-2011 Watermaster Budget.

BACKGROUND

A monthly cash disbursement report is provided to keep all members apprised of Watermaster expenditures.

DISCUSSION

Total cash disbursements during the month of January 2011 were \$3,048,507.12. The most significant expenditures during the month were The City of Ontario in the amount of \$719,613.83 (check number 14819 dated January 10, 2011), Aqua Capital Management, LP in the amount of \$478,091.63 (check number 14814 dated January 10, 2011) and GenOn West LP in the amount of \$317,570.53 (check number 14817 dated January 10, 2011). All three checks were part of the 2nd of four (4) annual installment payments for the purchase of Non-Ag Water.

SUMMARY

Issue – Record of revenues and expenses of Watermaster for the Period of July 1, 2010 through January 31, 2011.

Recommendation – Staff recommends the Budget vs. Actual Report for the Period July 1, 2010 through January 31, 2011 be received and filed as presented.

Fiscal Impact – Funds disbursed were included in the FY 2010-2011 Watermaster Budget.

BACKGROUND

A Budget vs. Actual Report for the period July 1, 2010 through January 31, 2011 is provided to keep all members apprised of the total revenues and expenses for the current fiscal year. The expense section is categorized into four distinct sections. Those sections are: General and Administrative Expenses; Optimal Basin Management Program Expenses; Project Expenses; and Other Income/Expenses.

DISCUSSION

The Budget vs. Actual report has been created from QuickBooks Enterprise Solutions 9.0, the Watermaster accounting system. The Budget vs. Actual report provided, balances to the supporting documentation in the Watermaster accounting system, as well as the supporting bank statements.

Year-To-Date (YTD) for the seven month period ending January 31, 2011 of the fiscal year, all categories were at or below the projected budget with the exception of category 6900 (Optimum Basin Mgmt Plan). Within the 6900 category is the regional board fine in the amount of \$62,675 which was posted to account 6909 (OBMP Other Expenses). The regional board fine of \$62,675 was not included as part of the fiscal year 2010/2011 budget. Also recorded within this category are the Watermaster's legal expenses. Currently, the legal expenses are above the Y-T-D budget as a direct result of the ongoing Desalter Negotiations of \$160,760, the Chino Airport Plume of \$45,570, Santa Ana River Critical Habitat of \$10,307, the Paragraph 31 Motion activity of \$58,192 and the South Archibald Plume (formerly known as the Ontario Airport Plume) of \$2,987. Several individual legal projects were below budget for the Y-T-D period. These were the Peace II (\$25,149), the Santa Ana River Water Rights Application of (\$3,988), Water Auction (\$22,150), Regional Water Quality Control Board of (\$5,159), Recharge Master Plan (\$19,609) and General Administrative Legal Costs (Pool, Advisory and Board meetings) of (\$31,546).

The budgeted amount for legal expenses for the entire fiscal year of \$450,000 was allocated at \$37,500 per month. For the seven month period, the cumulative Y-T-D budget was \$262,500 and actual legal expenses totaled \$432,716 which resulted in an over budget variance of \$170,216. To date, the legal contingency of \$145,000 has not been used.

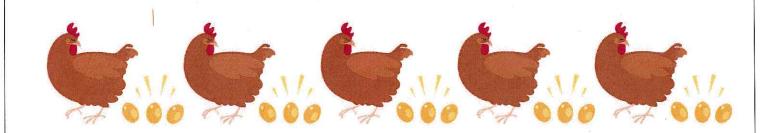

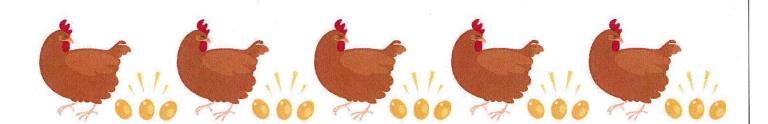

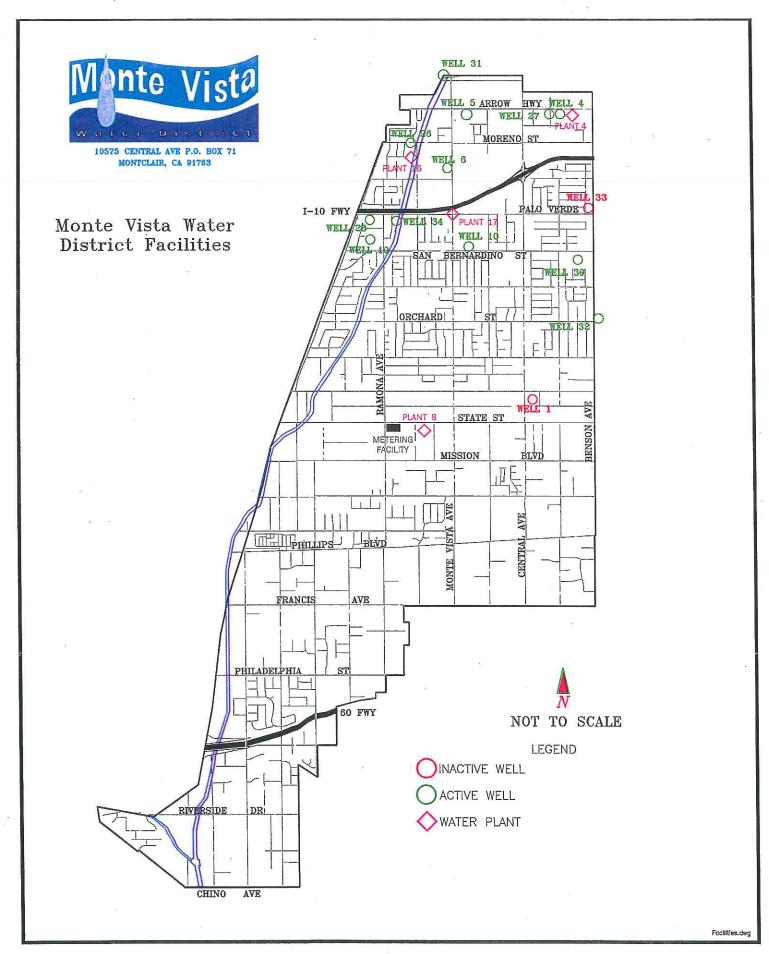

Background

The Court approved the Peace Agreement, the Implementation Plan and the goals and objectives identified in the OBMP Phase I Report on July 13, 2000, and ordered Watermaster to proceed in a manner consistent with the Peace Agreement. Under the Peace Agreement, Watermaster approval is required for applications to store, recapture, recharge or transfer water, as well as for applications for credits or reimbursements and storage and recovery programs.

Where there is no material physical injury, Watermaster must approve the transaction. Where the request for Watermaster approval is submitted by a party to the Judgment, there is a rebuttable presumption that most of the transactions do not result in Material Physical Injury to a party to the Judgment or the Basin (Storage and Recovery Programs do not have this presumption).

The following application for water transaction is attached with the notice of application.

 Notice of Sale or Transfer - The lease and/or purchase of 895.190 acre-feet of water from San Antonio Water Company to the Monte Vista Water District. This lease is made first from San Antonio's Annual Production Right, with any remainder to be recaptured from storage. Notice of the water transaction identified above was mailed on February 24, 2011 along with the materials submitted by the requestors.

DISCUSSION

Water transactions occur each year and are included as production by the respective entity (if produced) in any relevant analyses conducted by Wildermuth Environmental pursuant to the Peace Agreement and the Rules & Regulations. There is no indication additional analysis regarding this transaction is necessary at this time. As part of the OBMP Implementation Plan, continued measurement of water levels and the installation of extensometers are planned. Based on no real change in the available data, we cannot conclude that the proposed water transaction will cause material physical injury to a party or to the Basin.

The 85/15 rule does not apply for this water transaction because the City of Upland is utilizing this transaction to produce their San Antonio Water Company shares.

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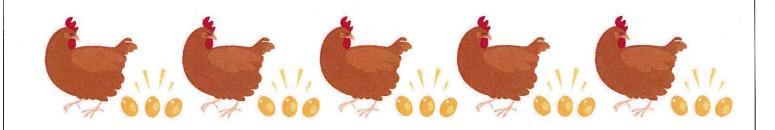

Proposed Procedure for Updating Agricultural Pool Parties for the Restated

Judgment

SUMMARY

Recommendation – Staff recommends approving the procedure outlined below for updating the list of Agricultural Pool names that are Parties to the Judgment

BACKGROUND

The 1978 Judgment included a list of Parties to the Judgment, including Overlying (Agricultural) Pool Parties. Since that time, many Agricultural Pool Parties have left the Basin and many new Parties have begun to pump from the Basin. Since 1978 Watermaster as tracked the list of current Parties as best as possible, sometimes legally intervening them and sometimes simply adding them to Watermaster's database. And of course there have been many instances where Watermaster was not informed that a well existed or that an ownership change occurred.

At the October 8, 2010 hearing, Judge Reichert requested that Watermaster issue a Restated Judgment that captures all changes that have been made to the Judgment. This includes changes to Party lists as well as Judgment Amendments.

Watermaster Staff has spent the last few months searching the online assessor records to determine the owner(s) of each known well within the Basin. During the months of December 2010 and January and February 2011, Watermaster staff met with representatives of the Agricultural Pool to detail the owners and users of each known well within the Basin. Watermaster is currently finalizing the list.

There are approximately 500 Agricultural Pool well owners. Watermaster needs to notify these well owners that they must be parties the Judgment in order to pump from the Basin. Watermaster Counsel will take the proposed procedure to Court to obtain the Judge's approval before beginning the process.

Watermaster is proposing the following procedure in order to update Agricultural Pool membership, and keep the list updated in the future:

- 1. The list of property (well) owners (as determined by assessor information from the counties) will be issued a letter from Watermaster. This list includes all well owners, even if they are already current Parties to the Judgment. The Agricultural Pool Committee will approve the content of the letter before it is mailed out. That letter will be co-signed by both the Watermaster Chief Executive Officer and the Agricultural Pool Committee Chair. The letter will be mailed via the United States Postal Service with Delivery Confirmation service. The letter will explain to the well owners that they are required to be a party the 1978 Judgment in order to pump water from the Chino Basin and it will explain the process. Recipients will receive a self-addressed stamped postcard with which they can object to intervention. The letter will state that absent an objection it will be assumed that they consent to the intervention.
- 2. In addition to the letters, an advertisement will also be placed in a local newspaper. This will help to ensure that due process requirements are met. There are likely still wells out there that are unknown to Watermaster so this step may also help to identify those wells.
- 3. In addition to well owners, there are a few instances of well <u>users</u> that are Parties to the Judgment. Those individuals will also be sent the letter and they will continue to be included as Parties to the Judgment.
- 4. The above procedure, along with a copy of the letter and the return postcard, will be submitted in advance to the Court for approval. In this way we will know in advance that the procedure is valid.
- 5. Another part of the process will be to establish a procedure to keep the Pool membership current on an ongoing basis. The difficulty for Watermaster has always been that it is generally not informed when there are owner or user changes to wells. Along with the approval of the letter and postcard, Watermaster will request that the Court issue an Order requiring all parties to the Judgment to notify any successor of the existence of the Judgment and to notify Watermaster of any transfer of the property or a well. Watermaster will set-up a link on its website for this purpose in order to make the process as easy as possible for the well owner.
- 6. Parties to the Judgment who no longer have an interest in the Basin should be dismissed.

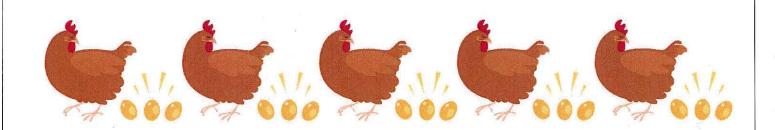

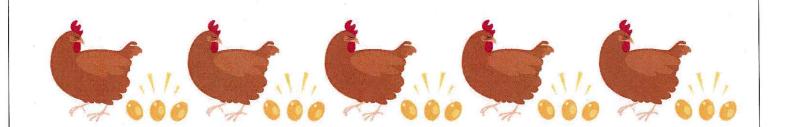
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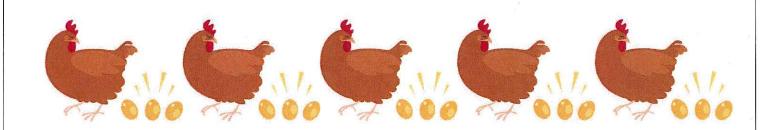

Brockovich pushes for chromium 6 limits

Environmental and consumer advocate Erin Brockovich on Tuesday shot off a letter to the federal Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment supporting its proposed public health goal for the cancer-causing hexavalent chromium in drinking water.

In December, the office, an arm of the Environmental Protection Agency, proposed a public health goal of 0.02 parts per billion of the chemical, also known as chromium 6, in drinking water.

Since leading the charge in landmark litigation against Pacific Gas & Electric in the 1990s, Brockovich has been the public voice on the dangers of chromium 6.

PG&E was accused of contaminating groundwater in the High Desert town of Hinkley, which allegedly caused hundreds of residents myriad ailments. The San Francisco-based utility doled out \$333 million to more than 600 residents.

The 2000 film "Erin Brockovich" brought Brockovich's story to the public arena, as well as that of chromium 6.

In a letter addressed to Michael Baes of the Pesticide and Environmental Toxicology branch of the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment, Brockovich said a public health goal for chromium 6 is long past.

"It was December 1987 when PG&E first notified the state of California they had polluted the groundwater of scores of privately owned drinking water wells in Hinkley; their reckless action causing death and disease," Brockovich said. "It has been over 11 years since the movie was

released bringing this issue national attention, and 10 years this week since Sen. Debra Ortiz introduced legislation instructing the state Department of Health Services to develop a recommended standard for chromium 6 in water by July 1, 2003, and to adopt a maximum contaminant level beginning Jan. 1, 2004."

The legacy of chromium 6 in Hinkley resurfaced late last year when residents learned that a toxic plume had expanded. A series of public meetings have occurred since.

PG&E has provided residents and the Hinkley Elementary/Middle School with bottled drinking water, offered to buy homes, has been setting up monitoring wells and has embarked on an aggressive cleanup effort to try to contain the plume.

Just last week, the Lahontan Regional Water Quality Control Board, which is overseeing PG&E's cleanup efforts, announced that an

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Bioreactors for water cleanup take shape

Work has begun on a \$19 million project that will use naturally occurring microbes to clean up contaminated groundwater from Fontana to Colton for nearly 17,000 people.

Texas-based Envirogen Technologies Inc. has begun building two giant stainless-steel tanks to be used as bioreactors.

In those tanks perchlorate- eating bacteria will turn hazardous groundwater in Rialto into quality drinking water, said Todd Webster, an environmental engineer with Texas-based Envirogen Technologies Inc.

Since its detection in 1997, a plume containing perchlorate in the Rialto-Colton basin has continued to move through the aquifer, resulting in the shutdown of nearly a quarter of Rialto's 22 wells, Envirogen said in a statement about the project.

Perchlorate is known to interfere with the creation of hormones that are critical to the development of fetuses and infants.

"The technology has been proven," said Webster. "We have done it many times before. What is

new is that this water will go directly into a potable water supply."

The project, planned for the site of the West Valley Water District headquarters, 855 W. Base Line Road, should break ground in May, said Tom Crowley, assistant general manager. The project - to be paid primarily by state and federal funds - is expected to produce up to 3 million gallons

"The outcomes of this large-scale project are going to be intensely

said.

watched around the county," Crowley said. There will be basically two parts to the project: two bioreactors to treat perchlorate-laden groundwater - now being built in Los Angeles and a separate facility to make that treated water ready for home and business consumption.

"Fine tuning," the second phase of the cleanup, is the pioneering aspect, Crowley said.

Once that is done, the California Department of Public Health will have established guidelines that can be followed in the certification of similar plants elsewhere in the state - and around the nation.

This will speed the time frame and reduce startup costs for future plants, Crowley said.

The project will, for the first time, provide real data - not estimates - on operational costs for a bioreactor water cleanup plant that moves its

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product directly into tap water, Crowley said.

The Rialto bioreactor will treat perchlorate, as well as nitrate, from groundwater at WVWD well No. 11, which has perchlorate levels of 20 parts per billion and the nearby city of Rialto's well No. 6, which has perchlorate concentrations of about 300 parts per billion.

The maximum contamination level for perchlorate in California is 6 parts per billion, although recently, one California agency published a draft recommendation that the public health goal be lowered to 1part per billion.

For several years, one of Envirogen's biologicallybased water treatment systems has been cleaning up perchlorate-contaminated ground and surface water in the Henderson, Nev., area.

Treated water from that plant has significantly reduced perchlorate concentrations in Lake Mead and the lower Colorado River, says the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Superfund website.

Earlier this week, the EPA said it will move forward to develop a national standard for perchlorate in drinking water.

Local water officials said the plant will be able to clean up water enough to meet that standard.

"We are confident that at whatever level the standard moves to, it will be something this plant can handle," Crowley said. "That is why we selected this technology."

Webster said the microbes used in the project are naturally occurring in the groundwater and soil of this area - but in small concentrations.

Before the cleanup process can begin, a small number of these microbes must be transformed into a very large population within the large stainless steel "reactor" tanks, Webster said.

"When you first get them going, they can be a little finicky," he said. But after the population mass expands significantly and the microbes settle in, they are very resilient."

Muddy water and the boom of churning boulders in the Santa Ana River on Tuesday marked the largest releases ever from the Seven Oaks Dam in Highland.

Engineers with the U.S. <u>Army Corps of Engineers</u>, which finished building the dam in 1999, monitored vibrations to make sure gates and the outlet tunnel were operating as designed, chief hydrologist Rene Vermeeren said. No problems were detected as the release was amped up from 500 cubic feet per second to 3,600 over six hours.

That was good news for officials who had to cancel a similar test in 2005 after water flowed underneath the floor of the outlet tunnel and eroded large sections of concrete.

After more than \$2 million in repairs, they had to wait for enough rain and runoff to be held behind the dam to complete the tests. December's storms helped push reservoir levels to the 2,359-foot elevation, the second highest level ever recorded.

"We've been waiting 11 years for this," Vermeeren said.

The Corps plans to release more water today and Thursday, when it will peak at 6,000 cubic feet per second, equal to 45,000 gallons per second. The amounts could be ratcheted down if predicted rainfall this week is heavy, he said.

A smaller test was conducted in July, when the Army Corps of Engineers released 2,500 cubic feet per second, enough to fill a medium-size swimming pool in one second.

The sight was an impressive one Tuesday as a wall of water shot out of an open channel below the dam, kicking up clouds of mist and sending small waves lapping at the rocky shores of a plunge pool. It takes about eight hours for the flow to reach Prado Dam.

"We're happy with the way (the dam) is performing," said Dave Lovell, an engineer with the San Bernardino County Flood Control District.

Over the three days of tests, a total of 10,000 acre-feet of water will be released. That is about one-third of what's been stockpiled behind the dam.

Local water agencies and conservation districts captured the lower flow of water at the beginning and end of the releases and diverted it to spreading basins to replenish aquifers.

About a mile below the dam, scientists from the U.S. Geological Survey floated a yellow acoustic sonar boat into the choppy river, pulling it between ropes to gauge the depth and velocity of the water.

In Riverside County, the Flood Control and Water Conservation District took advantage of the increased flow to wash newly delivered sand and rocks into the middle of the river along a 700-foot swath on either side of the Market Street Bridge, said Zully Smith, chief of operations and maintenance.

Truckloads of sand were brought from another basin that was filled up by the last round of storms. The move will help protect the toes of the 1950s-era earthen and rock levees from erosion, Smith said.

The district consulted with the U.S. <u>Fish and Wildlife Service</u> on the project. It was determined that the rocks would provide good habitat for Santa Ana suckers, small algae-eating fish that live in the lower and middle portions of the river.

The fish are listed as threatened under the Endangered Species Act and now exist primarily in a three-mile stretch of river south from Highway 60 in Riverside. After the

Psst... Groundwater and Surface Water Do Mix

An article published in the journal Geophysical Research Letters this week describes a new and simple way of measuring groundwater's contribution to small streams on the surface.

By taking snapshots of streams with a device designed to capture, through infrared radiation images, the sinking land levels in the San Joaquin Valley in California. temperatures in various parts of the water, the approach "advances the immediate detection and quantification of localized groundwater inflow for hydrology, geology and ecology," the article's authors, Tobias Schuetz and Marcus Weiler of the University of Freiburg's Institue of Hydrology, wrote.

Groundwater, they found, tends to be cooler than surface water in summer and warmer in winter; the infrared devices record the difference and produce images that show groundwater as clearly as night goggles show a human figure in the dark.

By coincidence, on Tuesday, the same day the article was officially published, the California state assembly's committee on water, parks and wildlife held a hearing on groundwater that was part science class and part exploration about what to do to regulate the use of groundwater in the state.

More than any state in the West, California severely limits the circumstances under which groundwater can be regulated in view of its connection to both surface water and other pockets of groundwater.

Only when it is in a "known and definite channel" underground is groundwater subject to significant controls. Hard pumping of the groundwater located outside such channels over the last 60 years has caused land in the San Joaquin Valley to drop more than 25 feet.

So while the Freiburg researchers show side-by-side photographs of streams as seen by the naked eye, and the same streams with the groundwater inflow clearly visible to infrared sensors, California water law, figuratively, closes its eyes, operating under theories that are largely oblivious to the connections that the Freiburg researchers and others have been documenting for decades.

Pumping groundwater beneath one's land is commonplace in agricultural areas, and largely unregulated. Although the state does now monitor the levels of groundwater tables, legislative efforts to establish a state system to permit wells or simply monitor the amount of water pumped have failed repeatedly over the past decade.

But, as demonstrated by the hearing called by Assemblyman Jared Huffman, chairman of the water and parks committee, the effort to manage groundwater as if it were part of the surface water system may finally be gathering momentum. (It was going nowhere when I first wrote about the issue back in 2009.)

As Thomas Harter, a hydrologist at the University of California, Davis and a witness at Tuesday's hearing, said in an interview, "In legal terms, there are, historically, two very different doctrines on how groundwater and surface water has been allocated."

But, he added, "to the degree that groundwater feeds streams it's important to stream flows and stream ecosystems." And "streams are an important component of the groundwater budget in California," he said.

Tony Rossmann, a lawyer in San Francisco. said that the state is unlikely to abandon its current legal distinction between groundwater an surface water soon.

The major constituency for the status quo is California's \$30 billion agricultural industry. But each new study that confirms the connections between water on underground and water on the surface gives a little more ammunition to environmental groups, legislators and water lawyers who want to bring groundwater under unambiguous state control, as it is in every other state except Texas.

Barry Nelson of the National Resources Defense Council took up the issue in a blog post this week, noting that over eight years, overpumping averaged seven million acre-feet each year, he noted. "The impacts of this level of unsustainable pumping are far-reaching — declining water tables, increasing pumping costs, rivers like the Cosumnes literally sucked dry from below, subsiding land and more."

"Liquid Assets," a report issued last year by the California legislature's legislative analyst's office, recommended phasing in a system of permitting groundwater withdrawals.

As the authors of the new Freiburg study, even though their methodology is currently limited to small streams, their measuring process "may well improve our ability of sustainable water management in water-scarce regions" —— maybe even regions governed by laws and court rulings that create distinctions that fly in the face of this kind of science.

Opening the tap

Region poised to lead in water-related R&D

LA VERNE - The water technology industry is going to be an economic anchor for the eastern San Gabriel Valley, according to William Lyte, president of Technoplex Inc.

Lyte delivered that assessment last week during a water technology conference at the University of La Verne.

Richard Hansen also spoke about the emergence of water purification technology and the potential for that industry's growth in La Verne and the Valley.

Hansen has served as general manager and chief engineer for Three Valleys Municipal Water District, which includes the eastern San Gabriel Valley, since 1981.

The conference featured water experts as well as venture capitalists and legal and business leaders. MWD Director Tim Brick delivered the keynote address during a luncheon that also featured a video message from Rep. David Dreier, R-San Dimas. Rep. Grace Napolitano, D-Santa Fe Springs, was invited but couldn't be

there because she was held up by bad weather on the East Coast.

Napolitano is a leading voice on the issue of water recycling. She is the ranking minority member on the House Water and Power Subcommittee.

The city of La Verne and its namesake university are positioned to lead the Valley in this industry which could bring job growth, university Vice President Phil Hawkey said.

"The University of La Verne is in a role to facilitate the growth of the water industry in La Verne," Hawkey said. "The university owns 50 acres of vacant

land that could be part of a water campus essentially a business and technology park that would focus on water-related industries."

La Verne's main campus is just minutes from the MWD's Weymouth Water Treatment facility, one of the world's leading water research laboratories.

Lyte also pointed out the city's importance as a leader in the field, noting that besides La Verne having a major university, it is also close to other major universities, including the Claremont Colleges.

"Major firms such as the Lewis Group of Companies are also committed to the success of this program, as is the region's world-class engineering industry," he added. "La Verne has a

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unique combination of educational, technological and business resources to become the center of water technology for the region."

During one of the panel discussions, Weymouth Research Lab scientists discussed research activities and provided presentations on water microbiology and purification techniques.

"Don't worry about water running out, because we know how to make more of it," said Ric DeLeon, a microbiologist with the MWD. DeLeon and his colleagues addressed concerns over growing pollutants in drinking water, such as chemicals found in toiletries and medication.

Fellow panelist Carrie Guo noted that while there are emerging concerns over contaminates, they are on a nano level. She compared the level of these types of pollutants to 10 drops in a Rose Bowl-sized water container.

Lyte, whose firm specializes in technology projects on the ports and in the green technology sector, moderated a panel on the monetization of water purifying technologies and also gave the conference's closing remarks.

"Southern California is acknowledged globally as the center of water technology innovation," Lyte said. "The region has the biggest water infrastructure, the most advanced water quality methodologies, at least 50 of the largest engineering firms in the U.S. and 84 consulates."

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
